

NEW DEPOT COMPANY

One Formed to Connect With the Terminal Facilities of Iowa Burlington

HAS CAPITAL OF \$150,000

This Move Assures Good Accommodations for the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern—General News of Railroads.

That the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern is to have a terminal of its own is made evident by the fact that yesterday articles of incorporation were filed by the St. Paul Terminal and Transfer company.

The company is formed to operate a railroad from the northern terminus of the South St. Paul Belt railroad to the site of the proposed freight depot of the B. C. R. & N., and connect with the terminal facilities of that road.

The limit of the new company will be in St. Paul. The capital is \$150,000. The home office is in St. Paul. The first officers are: President, Robert Williams; vice president, S. K. Tracy; secretary and treasurer, S. S. Dorward.

TRAINS DELAYED BY FLOODS. All Chicago-St. Paul Lines Suffer More or Less From High Water.

Heavy rains last night throughout Southern Minnesota, Eastern Iowa and Wisconsin seriously delayed the traffic of the St. Paul-Chicago lines.

President Ramsey, of the Wabash, said that the purchase was not made directly for his road. By ferry across Lake Michigan, the Ann Arbor has direct connection with the St. Paul, Chicago and Northern Wisconsin Central, Canadian Pacific, Green Bay & Western and Wisconsin and Michigan lines.

HILL AND PARTY AT LINCOLN. Trip Over the Burlington System Is Begun From There.

LINCOLN, Neb., May 21.—James J. Hill, president of the Northern Securities company, arrived in this city last night and today resumed his first tour of inspection of the Burlington road since he acquired an interest in the property.

Accompanying him are former Chairman C. E. Perkins, President George B. Harris, First Vice President Darius Miller, Second Vice President Howard Elliot, F. A. Delano and other officials. The party will go from here to Denver and then north over the recently completed line to Billings, Mont.

THREE-CENT FARE IN OREGON. Harriman Says Passenger Rate in State Is to Be Cut.

PORTLAND, Or., May 21.—President Harriman, of the Southern Pacific, who is now in this city, has announced that passenger rates on all Southern Pacific lines in Oregon will be reduced from 4 cents to 3 cents per mile immediately.

CZAR MEETS PRESIDENT

DESPOTISM AND REPUBLICAN HONORING IN FRATERNAL SPIRIT. Nicholas and President Loubet. His Guest, Exchange Toasts. Review the Troops, Dispense Taffy and Do Other Lovely Things.

TSARSKOYE, Selo, Russia, May 21.—The czar and President Loubet arrived here yesterday afternoon. The czar accompanied his guest to the palace, where President Loubet will reside. The president subsequently called upon the czar and the czarina.

At the luncheon after the review the czar offered a toast to the French army. He extolled that army and spoke of the fraternization of the French and Russian soldiers. President Loubet, in turn, toasted the Russian army.

CHICAGO 'CYRANO' INJUNCTION. Point Scored by Gross, Who Charges Rostand With Plagiarism.

CHICAGO, May 21.—Judge C. C. Kohlman, in the United States district court today, issued a perpetual injunction against the production in the United States of Edmond Rostand's play, "Cyrano de Bergerac," in the suit brought against Richard Mansfield and J. M. Palmer by Samuel Eberly Gross, the plaintiff in this case.

DENVER, May 21.—Richard Mansfield made the following statement this afternoon: "The decision of Judge Kohlman can have no effect upon the presentation of 'Cyrano de Bergerac' beyond the fact that Mr. Gross will receive royalties in the future instead of Mr. Rostand. What effect it will have in France is an entirely different matter, but it may probably result in the Theater Francaise artists withdrawing Mr. Gross with orders for plays, and Chicago may in the future be the center of another new industry."
