

# Investments and Sure Bargains in Real Estate

**ADPT. PERFORMAN**  
System Proposed by American Railway Association Effective July 1

**WILL INSURE ACCURACY**  
Charge of 20 Cents a Day for Cars Will Be Made Instead of by the Mile—Expected to Revolutionize Present System.

NEW YORK, May 27.—The necessary agreements to the plan of the American Railway association for establishing per diem charges for freight cars while in use elsewhere than on their home roads have been received at the headquarters of the association in this city.

The approval of a majority of the members of the association owning or controlling two-thirds of the freight cars was made a condition of the plan when it was adopted at the annual meeting, April 24, and Secretary Allen soon sent out notices to all the members that there were now no obstacles and the new plan therefore would go into effect July 1, the date fixed in the new rules. The agreements pledge the Secretary to adhere to the per diem plan for a year.

By imposing a charge of 20 cents for every twenty-four hours after the car is off its home road and in use on another, instead of a charge of six-tenths of a cent per mile run, the present rate, it is expected that this portion of railroad car accounting will be revolutionized and order and accuracy established.

There are about 1,500,000 freight cars owned by members of the American Railway association, and the gross amount of exchange rates for the new plan would be \$30,000 a day if all were affected. It is estimated that about 60 per cent of the freight cars remain on their home roads.

**\$8,000,000 IN IMPROVEMENTS.**  
President Harriman Tells of Plans in Oregon.

OMAHA, Neb., May 27.—E. H. Harriman, accompanied by President Burt, arrived from the West on a special train this afternoon and left three hours later for Chicago over the Illinois Central. President Burt, Harriman, and the other members of the Illinois Central, met Mr. Harriman in St. Paul and accompanied him and his party to OMAHA.

Mr. Harriman said that \$8,000,000 would be spent on the improvements west of OMAHA, but did not know at this time just how much would be used. He said that the track east of that city, improvement of the railroads along the coast, and the building of new lines, would be made in the near future.

**RAILROADS ARE ACCUSED.**  
Said That They Discriminate Against Sugar Beets.

CHICAGO, May 27.—Some of the Western railroads are accused of helping the American Sugar Refining Company to discriminate against the beet sugar trust. In its effort to kill the beet sugar industry in Nebraska and Colorado, says the Inter Ocean.

The Rock Island, Missouri Pacific and the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroads have joined the Malloy steamship line in making a through rate of 25 cents per 100 pounds on sugar from New York via Galveston to Kansas City, St. Joseph and Omaha.
