ROOSEVELT WILL BE THERE.

President Accepts Invitation to Open the International Olympic Games.

CHICAGO, May 2—Henry J. Furber, president of the International Olympic Games, received a letter from President Roosevelt today accepting an invitation to open the games in person. The president's letter was accompanied by letters from the department of state for use of the Olympic Games delegates, who will sail for Europe July 1 for the purpose of securing representation on the part of foreign nations.

President Roosevelt's letter follows: White House, Washington, May 28—I earnestly wish you success in your undertaking. While I regret that the United States cannot officially take charge of or be responsible for the games, I shall do all in my power to contribute to their success, and it will give me pleasure to open them and to send to them bodies of the United States troops and United States sailors to take part in the contests, in which representatives of the armies and navies of all nations are expected to enter. I hope these exercises will include feats of horsemanship and marksmanship, as well as tests of endurance and strength under service conditions. With good wishes for your success, I am, faithfully yours, Theodore Roosevelt.
