KILLED A MAN IN PHILIP BISHMAN, OF WASECA, IS BEATEN TO DEATH AT WILTON, MINN.

COMPANION IS ALSO HURT. Father, Mother and Son Are Under Arrest Awaiting the Action of the Coroner's Jury—News of the Northwest.

WASECA, Minn., June 19.—As a result of a row at a wedding feast at the home of Charles Kuyath in the township of Wilton, five miles south of here, Philip Bishman was found lying murdered in the barn on the premises and his companion, Mike Mulcahy, is under a doctor's care, suffering from a scalp wound that necessitated seventeen stitches, and is bruised from head to foot.

Yesterday morning Charles Lipke, a widower, was married to a sister-in-law of Charles Kuyath, and to properly celebrate the event, neighbors and friends were invited to come there in the evening.

They had driven out in a lively rig from this city and, unhitching the team, they took the beer into the barn. It is understood that later in the evening the parties made some insulting remark concerning the bride and trouble started.

Terrible Struggle Evident. In the back yard of the house were found evidences of a terrible struggle. Blood was scattered over the ground and clubs and stones were smeared with it.
