Great Northern and Northern Pacific to Run Homeseekers' Excursions

TO ALL POINTS ON COAST

Union Pacific Also Enters into the Agreement, and Tickets Will Be Sold First and Third Tuesdays Until November.

Commencing Tuesday, July 1, the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Union Pacific railways will put into effect a low rate homeseekers' rate to Pacific coast points.

These rates are made for the accommodation of the many homeseekers that will be unable to go to the West before the expiration of the original limit.

OMAHA, Neb., June 20.—The Union Pacific and Burlington roads and their connections today agreed on an extension of the harvest excursion rate from the Missouri river to the Pacific coast points during the summer and fall.

FIVE MEN KILLED

TWO ST. PAUL MEN AMONG KILLED

John Noble and Fred W. Moeller Among Wreck Victims.

Two victims of the wreck were residents of St. Paul.

NO EXPLANATION OF ACCIDENT.

Officials Here Are at a Loss to Explain the Catastrophe.

At the offices of Supt. Kimberly yesterday afternoon it was stated that little was known of the cause of the wreck and nothing further had been learned at a late hour last night.

TOLD BY TWO EYE WITNESSES.

Story of Iowa Men That Were on the East-Bound Train.

George P. Bellows and Arnold Neppert, both of Franch Creek, Iowa, were in the wreck at Staples, and in speaking of his experience to The Globe last night, Mr. Bellows said:

"I was on the incoming train, No. 8. I think it is, and I was lying down in a seat in the smoker when the crash came. I was thrown to the floor, but lit upon my feet. My right hand was caught against the window sill, and I could not have been no use, as it was completely covered with cars.

"I think we were going about forty or fifty miles an hour, and could not be certain of this. A man from Chicago, his name was Gordon, I think, had just passed through the car toward the front of the train. Neppert, who was with me, asked him to call 'Advance' and 'Retreat' through the car toward the front of the train."

"It was a terrible sight. The engine and baggage cars of both trains were piled up and the lights went out, leaving us in darkness. Conductor Noble was, I think, standing on a platform, somewhere between the two trains, and he was seen to be talking to the men."

"Mr. Neppert, who was traveling with Mr. Bellows, picked up Gordon, the man from Chicago, who was lying on the ground, and lifted him to a seat with some difficulty, as he is a heavy man."

"His face was white, and he was sure that the man was dead, but I found later that he still lived. The doctor, however, said that he did not think he could survive the injuries, as he is hurt internally."

"I do not see how so many of the passengers escaped, as we were going from Franch Creek to Staples, and I talked with some of the crew of both trains, but could learn nothing from them as to the cause of the wreck. The general impression was that the switch had been left open, and it was covered up with the cars."
