A. G. Bernard, of Cass Lake, who put in five months at Washington fighting for the Chippewa reservation bill, was in St. Paul yesterday. He is greatly pleased at the success of the bill and prophesies great future for the Cass Lake country because of it.

The sealed bid proposition was that of the secretary of the interior. He believed that more money would be obtained by this method than any other. The Minneapolis lumbermen thought that public competition would be the most satisfactory method.

DUBOIS ENTERS RACE Sauk Center Physician Is a Candidate for Congressional Honors OPEN CAMPAIGN AT ONCE

Backed by the United Democracy of the New Sixth District, Stearns County Man Is Ready to Wage a Winning Fight.

Dr. J. A. Dubois, of Sauk Center, yesterday formally entered the Sixth district congressional race by filing his certificate of candidacy for the Democratic nomination.

Dr. Dubois will at once start upon an active campaign for election. The nomination is conceded him, as he enters the race backed by the solid Democracy of the district.

The recent withdrawal of Judge Bruener, of St. Cloud, left the field entirely to Dr. Dubois, who filed only after numerous conferences with and at the request of the district leaders.
