

HEARING IS TODAY

PASSENGER OFFICIALS AND COMMISSION TO DISCUSS DAILY RESOLUTION

IT IS UNLIKELY THAT ACTION WILL BE TAKEN

The Conference Has Been Postponed a Number of Times, but It Is Believed That the Investigation Will Be Started This Morning—Railroad News.

This morning at 10 o'clock representatives of the various roads operating in Minnesota will meet with the members of the railroad and warehouse commission for the purpose of showing the commission that it is practically impossible for the roads to operate in the state on a basis of less than 3 cents a mile.

This will be the third or fourth time the representatives and the commission have got together on this question, but the roads have always pleaded that they were not ready, and the conference has been postponed.

To Be Commenced Today. Today, however, the conference will probably be commenced, although it will no doubt take some days to reach a conclusion.

Insurance Must Be Cheap. There is at present only one automobile in all Syria, but there is likelihood of a number of traveling freight agents who make their headquarters in the cities, and also a number of the office of the freight lines have been called down to Chicago to help the local office handle freight.

Word has been received from Chicago that the lines have pressed into service, as freight truckers, general office employees, and other commercial agents' offices and others who can be best spared to help tide over the present crisis. Men who have not done a day's work for many years have been forced to don their old clothes and truck freight. The roads have been no respecter of persons, and when the men have been enjoying exalted positions were asked to fill in the gap that was occasioned by the strike, and they responded with alacrity.

Telegrams were received yesterday by several of the Northwestern agents in the Twin Cities asking them to attend a number of the trouble. It is being rumored around that the freight handlers at Milwaukee are coming uneasy and that they will go out on a sympathetic strike in a few days. Since the trouble at Chicago all the freight that originally went to the Twin Cities to the East, and also that which is destined to Eastern points, has been switched to go via Milwaukee, across the lake, and the congestion of business at this point has caused the freight handlers to work overtime in lines via the head of the lakes are still untrammelled, and the business for the Northwest can be done via that port, but on all rail business the "Soo" line seems to hold the key to the situation, as they are not connected in any way with roads that are in trouble, and no doubt for the time being they will enjoy a large increase in both their in and out less than car load business.

The freight handlers in the Twin Cities do not appear to be going out on a sympathetic strike at the present time. A number of them said that they did not see any reason for going out, as they were receiving good treatment from the roads. Others look for a speedy adjustment of the matter, and do not think that it will extend outside of Chicago.

GO WITH THE ROCK ISLAND. Former Burlington and Cedar Rapids Officials Are Cared For.

White, formerly chief engineer of the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern, to be engineer of maintenance of way for the Rock Island; F. J. Spafford, former superintendent of telegraph for the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern, to be assistant superintendent of telegraph for the Rock Island; R. A. Mather, former general counsel for the Choctaw, to be general attorney for the Rock Island, vice Robert Mather, general counsel for the Rock Island.
