RETURN TRUE BILLS

MAYOR AMES, FRED AMES, "RED" COHEN AND IRWIN A. GARDNER ARE AGAIN INDICTED

ALL ARE CHARGED WITH EXTORTION OF MONEY

Gardner Cannot Secure Bond and Is Compelled to Go to Jail—Attorneys Will Ask Judge Simpson Today to Waive Bond in This Count, as \$15,000 Is Already Up.

Two more grand jury indictments were returned Tuesday afternoon, one against Col. Fred Ames and "Red" Cohen jointly, and one against Mayor Ames and Irwin A. Gardner jointly.

The indictment against Col. Ames and "Red" Cohen was that of extortion from Addie Mills, in the sum of \$15 on Feb. 4. They threatened to close her "candy store," 900 Third street south, unless the money was forthcoming.

The one against Mayor Ames and Irwin A. Gardner was for extorting \$15 on Dec. 11 last from Ida Elliott, whose place of business is on Tenth avenue south. She was informed that if the money was not forthcoming that she would have to get out of business.

Col. Ames was arraigned before Judge Simpson yesterday and was given until today to enter his plea. His bail was fixed at \$2,500. H. P. Gallagher, of the Consolidated Milling company, and E. N. Fairchild, of the Pillsbury-Washburn Flour Mills company, qualified as sureties.

Col. Ames expressed very little concern when he appeared in court yesterday, he went through the ordeal in a matter-of-fact fashion and seemed to be in no wise alarmed at the situation. He chatted freely with his friends, and even shook hands with many around the court room who have been personally interested in the prosecution of these cases against the city officials.

Gardner Is Arraigned. Irwin A. Gardner was also arraigned. His attorneys, Erwin and Fox, asked until Friday to enter their plea, which was granted. His bail was also fixed at \$2,500, which his attorneys thought was exorbitant, as Gardner was already under a \$10,000 cash bond pending of his last case to the supreme court, and he is also under \$5,000 bond on the first indictment that was presented against him, which case has never come to trial, and at the present time if compelled to put up the additional \$2,500 bond, the total amount he will be held for is \$17,500.

Could Not Secure Bail. Judge Brooks said that he was not familiar with the cases and in order to be on the safe side he would fix his bond on the joint indictment presented against him and Mayor Ames at \$2,500, and when Judge Simpson came in from the lake today he could reduce the bond and release him on his own recognizance.

Mayor Ames Must Come Back. Mayor Ames has been telegraphed by Sheriff Dreger, and it is understood that he will be in the city on Saturday and may possibly arrive Friday night. Of course, if he is to arrive Friday night, some consideration will be given to his actions in the past few weeks the county officials are of the opinion that he will be able to put in an appearance.

FUND WILL BE RETURNED. Many Minneapolis School Teachers Will Be Refunded Money. The officers of the Minneapolis school teachers' retirement fund will no doubt encounter some little difficulty in refunding the \$12,000 that had been paid in by teachers who were under the supreme court decision before the plan unconstitutional.

The funds are now in the hands of Treasurer Schlemmer, and the association will meet in a few days to devise some plan whereby it can be returned. It is said that some of the teachers have paid in from \$12 to \$20. In many cases where the names of teachers are unknown, some are married, some have left the state and some have severed their connection with the schools.

Boardman to Have Opposition. J. A. Kellogg, the well known attorney, has just received his certificate for county attorney on the Republican ticket in opposition to the present incumbent of the office, Fred H. Boardman. Mr. Kellogg has been a resident of the city for fifteen years, and has always taken an active interest in politics. He is a member of Rawlins post, G. A. R.

TRAGIC TERMINATION OF A BOAT RIDE

Misses Marva Pyle and Eva Fasken, of Fairbault, and Mabel Wells, of Monticello, the Victims—Two St. Paul Men, Companions, Save Themselves and Swim Ashore.

MANKATO, Minn., July 30.—Three young ladies were drowned yesterday afternoon at Lake Jefferson, near St. Peter, while boat riding. They were Mabel Wells, of Monticello, and Marva Pyle and Eva Fasken, of Fairbault. Charles Bingham and N. Hansen, of St. Paul, were with the ladies in the boat, and swam ashore, leaving the girls to sink in forty feet of water.

The accident happened thirty yards from shore. A storm came up suddenly and the boat capsized. Efforts to recover the bodies have been without result.

Miss Pyle was a daughter of C. G. Pyle, of Fairbault, a very well known citizen. The young lady was also a graduate of the Fairbault high school of the class of 1902. Miss Fasken was a daughter of Mrs. Asa Beebe. She was a graduate of the state university.

BODY OF CHARLES LIBBY FOUND.

Dynamite Brought to Surface—Sheriffs Hold Meeting. Special to The Globe. WINONA, Minn., July 30.—The body of Charles Libby, drowned yesterday afternoon at Lake Superior, was found opposite the Diamond mine, about a mile below where the drowning took place. The body was found by George Fischer and a party of fishermen. It was floating with only the head above the surface. Its early rise is accounted for by the use of dynamite by the searchers. The cramped position of the limbs bore out the statement that the drowning was the result of cramps.

It is announced that Cardinal Gotti, whom Pope Leo is said to have designated as the new pope, has been made prefect of the propaganda, or official in control of the church's affairs in the United States and countries where the Catholic is not a state church, to succeed the late Cardinal Ledochowski. Cardinal Gotti was born in Genoa, the son of a dock laborer. He was made a cardinal for good work in settling church difficulties in Brazil.

ROME, July 30.—Cardinal Gotti, the newly appointed prefect of the propaganda, said today: "I neither expected nor wished my appointment, but like a soldier, when my chief commands, I obey."

The appointment has produced a favorable impression. It is generally believed that American affairs will be dealt with under Cardinal Gotti with greater equity than under his predecessor, Cardinal Ledochowski, who had the reputation of favoring Germans and Poles to the detriment of Irish Americans.

Although it is generally approved, Cardinal Gotti's appointment came as a great surprise, and is resented by a number of cardinals who hold prominent positions and who have been passed over.

LA CROSSE, Wis., July 30.—One of the most destructive storms in years is raging here tonight. Railways have been washed out in all directions and

telegraphic communication practically paralyzed. Damage to crops will reach many thousands of dollars. A tornado north of here did great damage to farm property, many houses and barns being unroofed. The storm was general over Western Wisconsin.

HERMAN, Neb., July 31.—A waterspout northwest of Herman caused a washout of the Omaha road four miles north of here. About 1,000 feet of track are washed away, and the wind moved a dwelling house off its foundation near the washout.

The rain was a downpour at this place for about forty minutes. Some hail, but not enough to do damage to crops. Reports from other points of the state indicate that the whole state was visited by a heavy electrical storm. At Omaha, three houses were struck by lightning, but slight damage was done. No damage to crops from hail is reported, although much hail fell.
