ANGRY POLITICIANS MEET TO PLAN FOR VENGEANCE

their hands and support Davis if he would consent to be the man to whip Ives so hard that he will never again dare to attempt to break into politics. They put it to Davis in the light of a patriotic duty which he owed not alone to the district, but to his own town and county to squelch the man who had run as a Democrat and as a Republican and willing to run as any old thing to secure office.

They recalled to Davis, the local standing of Ives, who they said could not be elected as a delegate in his own precinct. Davis admitted all this, but said he did not want to run for congress. He has his eye fixed on something else, namely, the state senate, and does not care to change his plans, when some one else can whip Ives just as well, if not as effectually.

Morrison and Jones File. Then the troubles broke out afresh. A mass conference resulted and documentary evidence was produced to show the administration's hand in the candidacy of Ives. Schurmeier read law with Judge R. B. Galusha, and then entered the law school of Columbia college, New York, and supplemented that course at the University of Michigan. Upon returning to St. Paul he was called upon to take up the business of his father and has continued it with unvarying success.

Mr. Schurmeier evinced a marked taste for politics and started on what promised to be a brilliant career. He was cut short by the demands of his business. He was for years the chairman of the Third Ward Democratic organization, and was elected to the legislature of 1895 as a member of the house. As a legislator he demonstrated his worth, his civic zeal and his ability and disposition to protect the interests of the laboring men, of whom he has always been a champion. He passed the law prohibiting the contract system in penal institutions, one of the first steps in the march of emancipation or organized labor. He also passed the full citizenship bill, and secured the passage of the law requiring candidates wishing to run independently to secure the signatures of a fixed percentage of the voters of their districts, which resulted in greatly simplifying Minnesota's elections.

Speaking at the annual Haddock memorial service, held in the Hamline Methodist church last evening, Rev. Charles Scannell denounced Republicanism by declaring that all of the good Republicans were dead, and in the same breath intimated that William McKinley, great man as he was, had showed an inclination toward cowardice in evading the great economic and moral questions that confronted the nation.
