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WANTS \$500,000 FROM GERMAN EMPIRE

Ferdinand Holendorff Makes Futile Effort to Get Action Against the Kaiser's Realm.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—Ferdinand Holendorff today petitioned the district supreme court for a mandamus against Secretary of State Hay to compel the latter to institute proceedings against the empire of Prussia or the kingdom of Prussia or both, to recover \$500,000 damages for himself, for alleged unjust detention in a German insane asylum.

Holendorff is a native of Germany and a naturalized citizen of this country. He alleged that while bearing a passport from the United States government on May 11, 1898, he was falsely imprisoned in an insane asylum at Berlin, Prussia.

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"LIEUT." E. N. COFFEY PASSES BOGUS CHECKS

Taken in Tow With Army Transportation, Army Stationery and an Army Revolver.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 5.—"Lieut." Edgar N. Coffey, of New York, has been arrested in Oakland, California, with passing a bogus check on the proprietor of a hotel. His arrival at the hotel was preceded by a letter from the proprietor of the hotel, in which he was informed that the "lieutenant" had been arrested in Portland, Ore., and was being held by George W. McIver, captain of the Seventh Infantry, U. S. A., stating that Coffey was a second lieutenant of the army, and had been given credit on official business, requesting that his name and business be kept secret and that he be allowed to cash a check for \$155 which had been given to him. The letter was written on official paper and the "lieutenant" brought with him many apparently genuine credentials. The check was cashed, but suspicious were aroused when a second check was presented by Coffey.

An investigation was made and his arrest followed. Among his effects were found a great number of army official envelopes, large quantities of army stationery, many army transportation blank checks, and an army revolver, and an army revolver. At first he strongly protested his innocence, but finally admitted that he was not what he claimed to be, and that it was his first offense against the law. RIORDAN WANTS MEXICO TO PAY \$1,000,000 Archbishop on His Way to the Court in the Hague.
