

ROADS IN MONTANA

VALUATION OF THE COMPANIES IN THE STATE GROWING FAST

GREAT NORTHERN'S ASSESSMENT IS CUT

This Year the Figures Are \$40,191,671, Against \$15,485,670 in the Following Tables Showing Increase and Mileage of the Lines—General Railroad News.

Special to The Globe. HELENA, Mont., Aug. 6.—After considerable discussion by the railroad men and the members of the state board of equalization it was decided to reduce the assessment of the Great Northern in Montana from \$16,297,500 to \$16,000, which places the valuation of this road on a par with that of other main lines of this state.

Burlington Hearing Continued. Judge O. M. Spencer, of the Burlington, appeared before the board and asked that the railroad men be given another hearing before the action of the board was made final, and a continuance was decided upon.

According to the figuring of the board there has been a remarkable increase in railroad valuation in the state since the last assessment. At that time the valuation was figured at \$15,485,670, and this time it is \$40,191,671.

WESTERN TRAVEL STILL HEAVY

Many Take Advantage of Low Rates —Harvest Hands Moving.

Notwithstanding the lateness of the season, the rush of homeseekers to the West still continues, and it is estimated that fully 1,000 people passed through St. Paul Wednesday en route to the West, taking advantage of the low rates made by the Northern roads on the first and third Tuesdays of the month.

The Chicago lines brought many from the South and East, and the coast trains all carried extra equipment. The Milwaukee train Tuesday ran in two sections, mostly coming from Iowa.

Harvest hands are also hurrying to the Northwest, and the coast trains are crowded. About 600 have left St. Paul in the last few days.

This, together with the coast business, makes the travel exceedingly heavy through St. Paul. In fact it is heavier than it has ever been before at this time of the year.

It is expected that October will be the banner month of the fall movement, as the harvest in the states from where the settlers come will have been completed by that time.

NORTH DAKOTA VALUATIONS.

Board of Equalization Raises Main Line Assessments.

Special to The Globe. BISMARCK, N. D., Aug. 6.—The state board of equalization today increased the valuation of the main line of railroads \$1,000 a mile, making the valuation of all the main lines in the state for the purposes of taxation, \$7,500 a mile.

Branch line valuations were unchanged at \$6,500 a mile. Representatives of the railroads argued against the increase in valuation, but the members of the state board thought the increase of the earning capacity of the roads justified the increase.

There are approximately 1,400 miles of main line in the state, so that the increase of valuation will be about a million and a half of dollars. The total valuation of the railroad property in the state this year for the purposes of taxation will be about twenty millions.

TO MEET GREAT WESTERN CUT.

Western Roads Will Make New Tariff on Packing Products.

CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—At a general meeting of Western traffic officials today the members of the committee made by the Great Western on packing house products and dressed meats must be met.

Telegrams were accordingly sent by each of the officials notifying the interstate commerce commission of the new tariff, which go into effect Friday. No action has been taken by the Santa Fe and no expression given. It was also agreed that no reduction would be made in livestock rates here, but that a reduction in the rates from Omaha. This decision will immediately precipitate an investigation by the commission, whose ruling will be based on the tariff.

NORTHERN PACIFIC LOSES.

Company Must Reopen the Old Depot at Duluth.

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 6.—Judge Cant, of the district court, filed a decision today in the case of the state of Minnesota upon the relation of the railroad and warehouse commission against the Northern Pacific Railway company.

The case involves two principal questions, whether the depot at Duluth shall be required to reopen and maintain the depot at Twentieth avenue west, which was closed in May, 1901, and whether the road shall be required to run its passenger trains from which an excellent depot position and the packers are jubilant over their success in breaking the rates.

At a meeting of the board of the railroad officers were chosen: A. A. Wright, first vice president; J. W. Tower, second vice president; J. W. Cook, treasurer; J. K. Kollock, secretary.

Will Make Details Public.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—The executive committee of the St. Louis & San Francisco railroad will meet tomorrow for which full details of the new agreement of the Chicago & Eastern Illinois line probably will be made public. The terms, it is believed, will show that the deal involves a long time lease on an 8 per cent guarantee and not a direct purchase.

Veteran Engineer Retired.

Frank Sisco, a pioneer engineer of the North-Western line, has been placed on the retired list by the operating department of the road. He has been in active service with the road for forty-two years.
