

MILWAUKEE IN DEAL

ROAD MAKES TRAFFIC AGREEMENT WITH THE MISSOURI PACIFIC SYSTEM

COMPETE FOR CHICAGO-KANSAS CITY BUSINESS

Combination Gives the Road a Gateway Into the Latter City—Two Companies Will Control 12,163 Miles—Rockefeller Said to Be Behind the Move—General Railroad News.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—It is reported that a close alliance has been entered into between the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway and the Missouri Pacific system, one representing the Rockefeller interest and the other the great Southern railway system of the Goulds. By the alliance the former company will secure a direct line to St. Paul and the Missouri Pacific will gain a direct entrance from the Kansas City gateway into Chicago.

This will place the St. Paul system with a terminus more than midway to the Pacific coast and give it entrance into El Paso, Texas, over the Texas & Pacific tracks, which are owned by the Gould interests, thus tapping the great Southwest.

An Important Competitor. It means that the St. Paul will enter the field as a competitor for the traffic between Chicago and Kansas City, something it has not heretofore attempted to do.

It is said that the Rockefeller has come about at the instance of the Rockefeller and is part of the result of the Gould-Rockefeller combination at the time of the fight against the Pennsylvania.

By the merger the two systems control 12,163 miles, many important hauls will be gained by both lines, among others that to New Orleans for the St. Paul with water connections.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 8.—At the general offices of the Missouri Pacific here today a traffic agreement between the Missouri Pacific system and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway, Mr. Russell Harding, vice president and general manager, said this afternoon:

"We know nothing of such an arrangement. If there is an agreement of this kind it emanates from our New York office, and I have not been advised."

GREAT WESTERN'S POSITION. President Stickney's Circular on Packing House Rates.

The attitude of the Great Western on the question of grain rates and the reduction of them by the road is made known by a circular issued by President Stickney, which has just been received in St. Paul. Mr. Stickney speaks right out in regard to the position of the road in the matter, as will be seen from the circular which follows:

"During all the years the modus operandi has been for the railway companies to bill packing house products at the published rates, and to collect the full amount of such rates, afterward making settlement by paying back to the packers from 25 to 50 per cent of the amount so collected."

"Both the payment and receipt of such rebates are made by the interstate commerce law unlawful, punishable by fine and imprisonment."

"The misery of making rates by paying and receiving unlawful rebates, causing the agents of both the paying and receiving companies to live continually in the shadow of a penitentiary, as well as the inequality and uncertainty pertaining to such rates, has produced the disposition in both parties to adopt a more equitable method."

"As soon as the injunction was granted by the court, it was evident to both parties that the old method of making the rates by rebates was abandoned—that, therefore, lawful rates must be established by printing, filing and publishing the rates which would thereafter be acted upon."

"But no one seemed to know what uniform rates, under the circumstances, it is believed were collected."

"No one but themselves could ascertain the average rate they had actually paid during the years in which the secret rates were made in the manner which has been described."

"The packers went through the records and reported that, although sometimes they paid more, and sometimes less, the average rate was in fact actually paid during more than fifteen years between the Missouri river and Chicago was a fraction less than 16 cents per hundred pounds."

"The railroads felt that the average rate had been too low, and the packers expressed a willingness to pay a rate 5 per cent higher, providing it could be made uniform and stable."

"An advance of 15 per cent on the 16-cent rate is 2.4 cents per hundred weight, a considerable percentage of the packers' net profit and would make the rate 18.4 cents."

"The railroads says the railroads were in favor of accepting the proposition of the packers, but could not without also reducing weights on live stock, under a ruling of the commerce commission."

"They finally decided to make the packers pay the full published rate of 23 cents."

In all these towns there will be openings for merchants, bankers, real estate dealers, artisans of all kinds, and, in fact, opportunities that will attract a first-class type of settlers. The conditions along the Milwaukee in the new towns will be identical and great things are expected of the new settlements.
