COMMERCIAL BOWLING LEAGUE DECIDES TO DIVORCE GAME FROM THE SALOON

OFFICIAL ALLEYS TO BE RUN ON DRY PLAN

Constitution Adopted Is Built on New Lines—Many Commercial Houses Represented in Organization, Which Is to Include 90 Per Cent of St. Paul Players.

The St. Paul Commercial Bowling league is to divorce bowling from beer during the coming season. It has always been a feature of the bowling tournaments that between the games the members provide the social, and, if they desired, enjoy a foaming beaker of the amber fluid.

The constitution adopted last evening by the Commercial Bowling league prohibits the serving of beer or liquors on the alleys and rooms in which the games are rolled, and it also goes further and provides that the league games shall not be played on alleys owned or controlled by saloonkeepers.

The league elected the following officers: President—H. M. Fowler. Vice President—Dr. Harry Hunt. Secretary—F. Mapple. Treasurer—Harry R. Graham.

The official alleys as named in the constitution are: Court alley, Pfister alley, Doris alley, Munch & Anderson alley and York street alley.

It is expected that at least 90 per cent of the bowlers of the city will take part in the league tournaments.

Clubs to Be Classified. The session of the league will open about Sept. 20 and on Dec. 22 the clubs are to be classified in six classes of six clubs each.

H. R. Graham was made chairman of a committee to consult with the owners of the official alleys as to dates for the league games, prices and other matters.

A committee consisting of G. Bell, H. Kellar, H. R. Graham and Dr. Harry Hunt was also appointed to work up the league membership.

The board of directors are to be named from each of the leagues. A meeting will be held next Monday night at the rooms of the A. A. club.

PARDONED AND ARRESTED AGAIN FOR ABUSING HER CHILDREN

Mrs. Grelish, Recently Released from the Workhouse, Again in the Tolls.

Recently pardoned from the workhouse, where she had been sent for twenty days for abusing her children, Mrs. Grelish living at Fort Snelling, La Salle, was arraigned in police court yesterday on a charge of drunkenness. No disposition was made of the case, as it will be referred to the state pardoning board.

Mrs. Grelish was previously sentenced to twenty days in the workhouse for drunkenness, disorderly conduct and the abuse of her children. Neighbors petitioned the state board of pardons to have her released, as the baby was dying.

Mrs. Grelish was arrested for two days and then got drunk and began smashing up the furniture and chasing her family around the premises with a large club.

MANY APPLICANTS FOR TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES

Readers Are at Work on 50,000 Examination Papers.

The reading of the examination papers of the 4,000 applicants who took the examination for first grade teachers' certificates was commenced at the capitol yesterday. A force of 125 readers is at work, and it is expected the papers will be finished in about ten days.

There are over 500 papers to be read and marked, and the readers, who are selected by Supt. Olsen from various parts of the state, work seven hours a day, and are paid 50 cents per hour.

WOODMEN'S PICNIC IS RECORD FOR THE LODGE


Five Hundred People Turn Out to the Northern Lodge Outing at Lake Minnetonka.

PRESIDENT LATHROP SAYS A REDUCTION IS OUT OF THE QUESTION AT PRESENT

HE REPLIES PERSONALLY TO SCHURMEIER'S "REQUEST"

Says as Soon as the Consumption Is Proportionate With That of Minneapolis the Price Will Be Cut to \$1.20 Per Thousand Feet.

In a personal letter to Assemblyman Schurmeier, President Lathrop says that a reduction of the price of gas to \$1 at this time would be impossible. He hopes, however, at some future date to be able to announce that such has been decided upon by the directors.

Company Is "Requested." Two weeks ago the two bodies of the

council passed resolutions "requesting" that the gas company reduce the price of its product to \$1 per thousand feet. Assemblyman Schurmeier was the author of this touching little appeal and the personal letter received yesterday from President Lathrop was the answer to his efforts.

Is \$1.20 in Minneapolis. The fact that St. Paul is paying \$1.50 a thousand for gas, against \$1.20 charged in Minneapolis, is responsible for the attempt to secure a reduction. This President Lathrop answers by saying that as soon as the consumption in St.

Paul is proportionate with that of Minneapolis a \$1.20 rate will be given.

SUMMER INST. PAUL IS UNUSUALLY COOL

July 29 the Hottest Day of This Year, the Mercury Going to 88—Warmest Last Year Reached 104.

While other cities in the country have been having their share of warm weather, St. Paul has been enjoying a phenomenally cool summer. The hottest day of the year up to date was July 29, when, according to the records of the weather bureau, the temperature was 88 degrees.

During May the warmest day was on the 20th of that month, when the thermometer registered 85 degrees. For the corresponding month in 1901 the hottest day was May 1, when it was 90 degrees.

The warmest day in June this year was June 9, when the record shows 84 degrees. June 25, 1901, beat this by 12 degrees. July 29 this year was the hottest day in the month, and the top notcher for the year, the mercury climbing to 88 degrees. Last year the warmest day was June 24, when the record was 104. The warmest day this month was Aug. 1, when the thermometer show-

ORDER FOR PARK PLATS

BOULEVARD FROM FORT SNELLING TO SHADOW FALLS

Property Opposite the New Capitol May Also Be Converted Into a Pleasure Ground—Channing Seabury Urges Board to Renew Its Efforts in This Project, Which May Be Successful.

Channing Seabury, of the state capitol commission, has written to the city park commission asking it to redouble its efforts in securing control of the triangular piece of ground west of the new capitol for park purposes. He says it would enhance the beauty of the capitol grounds and at the same time permit the removal of an ugly jog which now exists in the street facing the west entrance of the new building.

When considered some months ago, it was figured that cost and improvement of this piece would be very near \$70,000. The magnitude of the project somewhat discouraged the board and it was allowed to drop.

Big Building on the Site. The ground is at present covered by a wood yard and a number of small shacks, but it is understood these are to be removed and a costly apartment house erected. For this reason the appeal for renewed activity was made by the capitol commission.

Mr. Seabury has explained to the board that the cost to property owners generally can be materially reduced by spreading the assessment liberally.

New Park Plats Ordered. Another big park project into which new life has been infused by the issuance of an order for plats is the Mississippi river boulevard and park extending from Shadow Falls park to the Port Snelling bridge. It is an old project which has been hanging fire for the past eight years, and the cost will be close to \$75,000. This is the figure estimated by Supt. Nussbaumer.

The boulevard and park includes a driveway skirting the bluff for nearly three miles and a half. The park will take in the slopes of the bluff down to the water's edge the entire distance and also several sections of acreage, one of which is thirteen acres in size.



OPPOSES PENNY POST

POSTMASTER M'GILL IS AGAINST ONE-CENT LETTER TARIFF

Proposition to Reduce the Rate for Carrying Letters Is No Longer Favored by Postoffice Department Officials—Believe Deficit Would Be Greatly Increased and Prospect Will Be Abandoned.

"Our department is opposed to 1-cent postage," said Postmaster McGill yesterday. "There is not a postmaster in the country or an official connected with the mail service who would not deem it a great disaster should the postage of first-class matter be reduced. There is not a country in the world, other than the United States, where the mail tax is so low and equitable. To change the present tariff to a 1-cent basis, would only increase the deficiency that annually exists."

"Of course, business men, who are large users of the mails, want the reduction. It is to their interest to have a 1-cent postage, but as only a small percentage of the people of the country are engaged in mercantile pursuits, it is safe to say that the majority of the people are contented with the present rate of postage."

"The government loses in carrying all classes of matter, with the exception of first-class mail. This deficiency is caused by carrying this mail at a loss, is partly made up by the surplus derived from the 2-cent postage. Reduce the postage to 1 cent and the department's deficiency fund will increase at least 50 per cent."

"What money is not supplied by the sale of stamps must be secured by taxation. Men who use the mails but little are called upon to pay for letters carried for other parties. However, I do not think that the present agitation for a cheaper postage will meet with favor at Washington. The postmaster general is opposed to it, and congress will not meddle in the matter."
