HOUSEMAID SERVES THIRTY-ONE YEARS IN ONE PLACE

Julia Challener Wins Prize Offered by Federation of Women's Clubs and Many Other Servants Disprove Ancient and Accepted "One-Month Term" Supposition.

St. Paul has a housemaid who has lived in one family for thirty-one years. Her name is Julia Challener, and she is an employe of Mrs. W. B. Bend, 239 Summit avenue. Miss Challener has received the first prize offered by the Minnesota Federation of Women's Clubs to the maid who has served longest in one family. The contest, the result of which was announced yesterday, will make cheerful reading for St. Paul housewives who are beginning to believe that there is no solution for the domestic problem.

MARS HAS INHABITANTS BRAINIER THAN EARTH'S

This Conclusion is Reached by a Chicago Astronomer.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—That a people superior in intelligence to those of the earth inhabit the planet Mars is a conclusion that will be set forth by Prof. G. W. Hough, head of the department in astronomy of Northwestern university, in a report which he is compiling that climate conditions of Mars are the same as of the earth. The possibility of Venus and Mercury being inhabited is admitted because they have solidified, and the intense heat resulting from their proximity to the sun may have been overcome by a deeper covering of atmosphere. None of the other planets, in the opinion of the professor, could contain animal life.

UNIFORM LAW FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF TAXATION

National Civic Federation Will Work in the State Legislatures.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Following the adoption of resolutions by the taxation department of the National Civic Federation, favoring the principle interstate comity as applicable state and local taxation, which provides that the same property shall be taxed at the same time in all states, and suggesting various other remedies for the existing systems, the executive committee of the department has decided upon preliminary steps, with a view to bringing matters before the state legislatures. A bill will be submitted to all them for a uniform law.
