RECORDS OF SECURITIES COMPANY ARE PLACED AT SERVICE OF GOVERNMENT

HEARING IN BIG SUIT IS RESUMED AT NEW YORK

Col. W. P. Clough Answers Frankly All Questions Relative to the Acquisition of Great Northern and Northern Pacific Stock - Case Comes to St. Paul Oct. 20.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The hearing in the action of the United States to prevent the Northern Securities company from holding the stock of the Northern Pacific and Great Northern railroads was resumed today before the special examiner appointed by the Minnesota federal court.

Col. W. P. Clough, general counsel of and a director for the Northern Securities company, was the first witness.

In the company's answer to the complaint of the government, it says that five-sixths of the stock of the Great Northern Railway company has been "negotiated for." Mr. Clough wanted to know what the words "negotiated for" meant. Col. Clough said that "of the 1,150,000 shares of \$100 which have been issued, the Northern Securities company now owns 850,000 shares, 1,233,824 shares, which amount includes 458,017 shares controlled for voting purposes."

The holders of the smaller amount, he said, virtually hold them as trustees for the Northern Securities company. Col. Clough could not remember the date of the first transaction of the company in the stock, but he promised to find the date and send it to the solicitor general.

Paid for Stock.

"We were carrying a considerable quantity of Northern Securities in the same way," Col. Clough said, "and we thought it desirable to carry some portion of Great Northern in the same manner."

"How much Northern Pacific were you carrying?"

"About twenty odd millions. Later more was acquired," he said.

"Did you pay for it with stock of the Northern Securities company?"

"On Sept. 1, 1901, we purchased \$7,022,222 of Northern Securities, 70,000 preferred stock and other shares later, for which we paid \$8,815,629 in cash and \$2,491,871 in stock at par of the Northern Securities company."

On Dec. 27, 1901, we purchased convertible bonds of the railroad company for \$34,709,962.50 for cash."

"From whom did you purchase those stock and bonds obtained?" asked Mr. Richards.

"From Mr. Harriman and his associates. Their names now appear on the books of our company. The amount of the stock issued in part payment for the railroad stocks."

"By whom were the negotiations for the purchase of the company conducted?"

"By the firm of J. P. Morgan & Co."

Records Are Open.

In the Peter Power suit J. W. Perkins, of J. P. Morgan & Co., testified that he made the deal. "No annual report of the Northern Securities company has yet been made, but the witness said, 'all its records are at the service of the government. The annual meeting of the company is to be held Nov. 16. Subject to the right to cross-examine Mr. Harriman, who has permission to peruse and amend his testimony, Mr. Richards said he had no further witnesses to call. The witness said the defendant was not ready to go on just now. He and his associate counsel went into conference to decide upon the time and place for the next hearing, when they will present their side of the case."

It was announced after the conference that it had been decided to postpone the further hearing until Oct. 20, in the federal building at St. Paul.

SEEK HOMES IN NORTHWEST.

Increase of 32 Per Cent in Immigration - New Arrivals Come This Way.

The Western Passenger association has issued a circular giving an interesting comparison of the alien and citizen arrivals in New York for the first eight months of 1901 and 1902.

This year for the first eight months there has been an increase of 37.15 per cent, 23.36 per cent over the same period last year. For 1901 the number of alien arrivals during the first eight months was 123,000, and for 1902, 163,266, making a total of 302,265. For 1902, during the same length of time, 336,283 aliens, and 13,792 citizens arrived, making a total of 350,075. It will be observed that this year the number of citizen arrivals is less than last year, the greatly increased number of aliens arising from the percentage increase.

The great majority of these alien arrivals were immigrants, seeking homes in this country. These immigrants have scattered to all directions, but it is safe to say that the Northwest has attracted the largest number. Thousands of these immigrants have been attracted to the undulating hills and valleys of Minnesota, the wide stretches of Dakota, the broad plains and the mountains of the West, and the mountain regions of Washington and Oregon. The largest number of settlers, from the East and from foreign countries, is rapidly distributed to the development of the great Northwest.

TO MEET AT SIOUX CITY.

Burlington to Connect With Great Northern at That Place.

The party of engineers of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy in the field surveying a new line from Des Moines to Sioux City are making considerable progress. They are laying the plans for a proposed connection between the Burlington and the Great Northern at Sioux City. The shortest route possible is being selected.

MAKES BIG LAND DEAL.

Northern Pacific Sells 169,569 Acres for \$1,017,361.

The Northern Pacific has just completed a deal for the conveyance of 169,569 acres of land in Chehalis county, Washington, to the Weyerhaeuser Timber company. This land was obtained from the government as a grant to aid in building the road to the coast.

The Northern Pacific was given all the land in every odd section for a distance of forty miles on each side of the main line. The price received for the land deed was \$1,017,361.

MEXICAN LINES COMBINE.

Consolidation of Roads Worth \$30,000,000 Completed.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 25.—All the railways in the state of Yucatan, embracing an aggregate extension of 600 kilometers and valued at \$30,000,000, have been consolidated under one management.
