Seventy Shocks Felt, Harbor Works Damaged and Houses Destroyed.

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 28.—Later reports from Salina Cruz, the Pacific terminus of the Tehuantepec National railway, regard the earthquake which Tuesday, confirm first reports. There were seventy shocks that afternoon, and in the meantime a furious gale and storm sprang up. 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Hot for Twelve Years.

It is scientifically reported that the lava streams from Vesuvius in 1853 were so hot that twelve years later that steam was issuing from the cracks and crevices, while the lava beds from the eruption of 1853 in 1877 were found to be steaming hot just below the top crust as late as 1890. But still more remarkable are the scientific reports of the volcano Jorullo, in Mexico. This sent forth immense streams of lava in 1759. In 1780 the lava beds were examined by a party of scientists, and it was found that a stick thrust into the crevices instantly ignited, although there was no discomfort experienced in walking on the hardened crust. Again some forty years after the eruption it was visited by scientists and reported to be steaming in many places. Some even eighty-seven years after the eruption columns of steaming vapor were found to issue from the crevices. Sometimes the upper crust of such a stream of lava cools so that plants and lichens find their way to the surface, while a few feet beneath the lava is almost red-hot.

FIGHT FOR MACADAM

REALTY HOLDERS IN CROCUS PLACE OPPOSE ASPHALT PAVING AWARD

Bids Will Be Opened Today for Expensive Work, but Non-Residents Will Follow Them to Council—Ninth Street Property Owners Petition for High Priced Surfacing.

Today the board of public works will open bids on street paving and sewer improvements amounting nearly \$40,000, the principal one of which is for the proposed paving of Crocus place with asphalt.

Non-Residents Protest.

Crocus place is among the select and aristocratic residence districts of St. Paul, but much of the property which is unimproved belongs to persons who do not live on the street and they are opposed to the use of asphalt. They want macadam instead, contending that it is cheaper and more lasting.

Ask Expensive Improvements.

Another big paving improvement, the final order for which will be sent to the two council bodies at their next meeting, is the surfacing of Ninth street from the corner of Gatzert street with asphalt. The cost will not be far short of \$50,000. Despite this fact a majority of the property owners are favoring it. Petitions have been filed asking that the improvement be made.

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RIVER MEN BATTLE

THREE SAILORS ARE INJURED IN MINATURE NAVAL ENGAGEMENT ON STEAMER

SHOTS ARE FIRED AND PIKE POLES ARE USED

Attempt of Charles Kinzie, Mate of the Twin City, to Swab Decks of Cyclone With Members of Crew Results Disastrously—Fight is Fierce and Prolonged.

Three river sailors of the steamers Cyclone and Twin City were seriously injured during Kinzie's naval battle, which raged for almost an hour last night at the Jackson street wharf.

Attack Begins.

Kinnie seated himself on a keg to wait. Hughey and Teal were talking about a proposed trip down the river and Teal, in a jest, said that he thought he would go to rolling barrels.

Tide of Battle Turns.

Denies He Started It.

Kinnie denied last night that he caused the trouble. He said that the men of the Cyclone had picked him and taunted him beyond endurance. He says that he struck Hughey because the latter called him a vile name. Kinnie also denies having used a revolver.

To Spread Doctrines.


