press dispatch from Washington to the effect that it has been suggested that the miners return to work, and that congress and the Pennsylvania legislature investigate conditions, with the view of recommending remedial legislation, but he declined to discuss the new proposition.

It is believed he has his mind made up on that point, but would rather have the proposition placed before him in some official way. It is the general opinion about strike headquarters that the proposition in its present form would not be entertained by a convention of the miners. The strikers have all along argued that they want some definite concession and no promises.

There was a rumor here tonight that the operators on Monday would post notices at all collieries requesting the men now on strike to return to work.

Mr. Mitchell's attention was called to this, and his only reply was that the operators have been making every effort since the strike started to get the men to return to the mines, but have failed.

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One method suggested in the petition is provision for the appointment of an emergency receiver to operate the Pennsylvania mines which are closed on account of the strike.

The petition is being circulated all over Chicago and throughout Illinois under the direction of United States Senator Mason.

"There are numerous instances where temporary receivers have been appointed for the management of public utilities," said Senator Mason, "and which afforded ample precedent for such an action in the present emergency. Railroads have been thus treated by the courts upon the petition of the people. I have in mind, too, a case where a dispute between a municipal and a water works company, which threatened to deprive the people of a water supply, resulted in the appointment of a receiver until the trouble was settled."

OFFER OF COAL LANDS MADE.

President Roosevelt Given a Chance to Stipulate Method of Control.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Charles Barry, a lawyer, whose office is given as the headquarters of a company claiming to control a large acreage of coal lands in Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky, has written to President Roosevelt, offering the control of these lands under any conditions the president may suggest.

Mr. Barry claims to be acting in the interests of the public. He says, however, that it will be necessary to furnish the means for the development of these coal fields, which hitherto have not been worked to any appreciable extent.

Canadian Coal Coming In.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—The secretary of the treasury has received a communication from the collector of customs at Portland, Me., in which he states that the Dominion Coal Company of Canada is about to export to the United States 100,000 tons of anthracite.


