OWNERSHIP OF PROCEEDS OF WOODMEN POLICY DISPUTED

Father and Sister of Albert Smith, Whose Life Was Insured, Lay Claim to the Money—Former Contends His Son Had No Sister Named Christine Johnson, to Whom the Policy Was Payable.

ST. CLOUD, Minn., Oct. 18.—One of the most peculiar cases that has ever come before the district court in this city was given a hearing before Judge Searle this afternoon. The case is a consolidated one and the point in question is to whom belong the proceeds of a \$2,000 policy in the Modern Woodmen of America.

Over a year ago Albert Smith, a resident of Little Falls, was killed in the woods. He carried a policy of insurance in the society, made payable to his sister, Albertina Kowalsky. She started an account with the society through Morrison county. Herman Smith, father of Albert Smith, started a similar action in Hennepin county, and the Modern Woodmen declined to pay the face of the policy until it had been determined whether the policy was in force at the time of his death. The society finally paid the amount asked to Judge Searle and the cases were consolidated and sent to this county for trial.

The father contends that his son had no sister named Christine Johnson, when the policy was issued, and lays claim to the money on the ground of his being next of kin. The contention of Albertina Kowalsky is that her brother Albert always knew her as "Tina" and that he did not know to whom she had been married after he left home, but imagined that it was to a man named Johnson. Hence Christine Johnson was named as beneficiary. The money is in the hands of the court and he is asked to determine who is entitled to it.

PROPOSED RECIPROcity TREATY WITH NEWFOUNDLAND

Butler failed to kick. This was the only score made in the first half.

In the second half the navy kept the ball in Lehigh's territory most of the time, but while the game was in progress, an end, failed to gain, and Belknap missed a field goal. Lehigh tried to get the ball back, but it slipped from them, and Whiting fell on it for a touchdown. He then held the ball for a moment, and his men had touched the ball and refused to play. Dr. Dashed had to leave the field. The game was suspended for a moment, but the Pennsylvanians tried to carry off the ball after the game and nearly precipitated a riot. Time of halves, 20 minutes.
