This booth will serve to display such a collection of miniature men and women as will delight the hearts of all the children who visit the bazaar. The candy booth is an immense beehive, draped in yellow and white, with a thatched top. Very natural yellow and black bees decorate this booth.

In the corner is a Moorish pagoda, where all next week an Arabian fortune-teller will foretell the future for the benefit of the inquisitive. A grocery booth, a furniture booth, a fancy work booth, a literary booth and an administration booth will be other attractive features of this room. A large doll house furnished and lighted with tiny electric lights will doubtless tempt even grown folk to stop and play with the dolls.

The card room, which opens off of the ball room, by the magic of soft draperies, easy chairs and comfortable couches, has been turned into a smoking room for the men. Soft-hooded lights will add to the attractiveness of this room, and what will be of more importance, the men patronizing the room will be well stocked cigar booth in one corner. John O'Connell, better known to the police as "Spot" McConnell, was turned to the penitentiary yesterday by State Agent Whittier. McConnell will remain at the institution to serve out four years of a ten years' sentence, unless he is again paroled.

HELPING A FRIEND LEADS TO BANKRUPTCY

Lars John Hegman, one of the victims of Albert Haas, the Payne avenue grocer, yesterday filed a petition in bankruptcy in the United States district court. He gives his liabilities as \$1,385. Of this sum \$1,230 is for a note executed by Mr. Hegman jointly with Haas in favor of Julius Tebeau. The money went to Haas, who shortly afterwards disappeared, and when the note was due Tebeau brought suit in the district court. Last week the case was tried, and the jury rendered a verdict against Hegman.

The balance of the indebtedness, \$155, is also a debt thrown upon Hegman by the missing Haas. It is for money of the Swedish Lutheran mission entrusted to Hegman, and by him turned over to an investment. The plausible grocer seemed a veritable Napoleon of finance to the honest, hard-working mechanic, as for many others, and he readily listened to his schemes for conquering fortune by a short and easy method.

Mr. Hegman's assets are stated at \$1,230, the value of his household, which is claimed as exempt. In addition to this is a note of Haas in Hegman's favor for \$800, which he describes, doubtless with perfect accuracy, as being of doubtful value.

Edward J. Lee, a railway brakeman, filed a petition showing his liabilities to be \$365.60, and his assets \$75. The petition of Charles R. Hammargren, a typesetter, states his liabilities at \$659.68 and his assets at \$290.70.
