

THE GAMBLER MUST FOIL

IS SENT TO THE WORKHOUSE WITHOUT THE ALTERNATIVE OF PAYING A FINE

JOHN MATHEWSON WILL BOARD THERE FOR A MONTH

Acting in Harmony With the Anti-Gambling Policy of Mayor Jones, Judge Holt Refuses Him the Usual Option - Other Gamblers Let Off With a Mere Fine.

"It is the disposition of this court to stand by the city administration in its efforts to check the crime of gambling. Under these conditions I will impose a sentence of thirty days straight in the workhouse, without the option of a fine."

Mathewson at first pleaded not guilty but when, Ed. Hall, Charles Peterson and Charles Herman, who were arrested at the same time as Mathewson, pleaded guilty to the charge of gambling and were fined \$20, Mathewson changed his plea.

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SPLENDID MOOSE HEAD FOR THE PRESIDENT

Alaskans Present a Fine Specimen to Mr. Roosevelt--Will Go Into the State Dining Room.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 28.—A party of citizens of Alaska called by appointment upon President Roosevelt today and presented a magnificent moose head, one of the finest specimens of the kind ever mounted. The animal was killed in the Cook's Inlet region. The antlers measure fifty-four inches from tip to tip. The mounting bore this inscription:

"Theodore Roosevelt, from the citizens of Valdez, Alaska, in token of their esteem and in recognition of his friendship, on his forty-fourth birthday, Oct. 27, 1902."

The party consisted of V. T. Hoggett, Robert Blye, Capt. J. J. Healy, Mr. Robbins, Mr. McNair and F. C. Helm and wife, residents of Nome, Valdez or other Alaskan towns. They were introduced by Representative Wooten, of Texas. The president expressed his appreciation of the handsome present and announced his intention of having it placed conspicuously in the state dining room of the White house.

The party extended an invitation to the president to visit Alaska on a hunting trip, assuring him that if he would make the trip he would be afforded an opportunity to shoot a polar bear. The president exhibited to the present fine specimens of gold, copper, diamond and other mineral products of Alaska and urged upon his attention the conditions, resources and necessities of the territory. It was pointed out to him that while there are 65,000 American citizens in Alaska they have no government, no representation in congress and are subjected to regulations entirely applicable to their condition. The president was urged to commend to congress the particular desirability of legislation to protect and promote the interests of Alaska.

Minor state officers or justices of the supreme court are to be voted for in Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Iowa, Maryland, New York, Pennsylvania, Utah, Washington and Montana.

Senators' Terms Expire. The terms of thirty United States senators expire March 4, 1903. Five have already been filled by the election of James H. McCreary (Dem.), Kentucky; Joseph B. Foraker (Rep.), Ohio; Arthur P. Gorman (Dem.), Maryland; and Samuel B. McEnery (Dem.), Mississippi. In the following states legislatures which select a senator are to be chosen: New Hampshire, Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, North Dakota, Colorado, Nevada, Washington and California. The legislatures of Oregon, Arkansas and Georgia, which also select a senator, have already been chosen.

Aside from the two principal political parties, a dozen others have ticked in on the field of minor organizations, the Prohibitionists and Socialists have more than the others. The Prohibitionists have made nominations in Illinois, Texas, Idaho, South Dakota, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Kansas, Tennessee, Wisconsin, Indiana, Minnesota, Colorado, California, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, New Hampshire, Vermont, New Mexico, Montana, Wyoming, Montana, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Kansas, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and New York.

The Socialist-Labor party is represented in Ohio, Wisconsin, Colorado, Massachusetts and Connecticut, and the Social Democratic party in Washington, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Colorado, Massachusetts and Connecticut. The other parties have tickets as follows: Peoples' Polls, Texas, Idaho, Colorado, Allied Populists, Texas, Kansas; Populists, Washington, Idaho, Colorado, Montana, Public Owners, Missouri; Liberal Democrat, New York; Union Republican, Delaware.

ALL EXCEPT MAINE, VERMONT AND OREGON ENGAGE IN PARTY TILT NEXT WEEK

SENATORS' TERMS EXPIRE IN THIRTY NEXT MARCH

Principal States Officers to Be Chosen in a Large Number, Congressmen Only in Nine—Delegates to Be Named in Arizona, Hawaii, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Porto Rico.

There will be elections in forty-two states next Tuesday, the other three (Maine, Vermont and Oregon) having already selected this year, state officials and their representatives in the Fifty-Eighth congress. In 23 of the 42 states, a governor and other state officers and congressmen are to be chosen, in 11, minor state officers or justices of the supreme court and congressmen are to be voted for, while in 9, congressmen only are to be elected.

The principal state officers are to be chosen in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Kansas, Idaho, Delaware, Colorado, Alabama, Texas, Michigan, Kansas, Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Wisconsin, North Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho, Nevada and California. New Hampshire elects only citizens in Alaska, a governor and railroad commissioner, and Pennsylvania, a governor and two other state officials.

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
