

DISCOUNTS GOING FAST

RECEIPTS OF GOVERNMENT AT EIGHT TOWNS ARE OVER ONE MILLION

PUBLIC DOMAIN IS BEING RAPIDLY PRE-EMPTED

Influx of Settlers is Due Largely to Efforts of Passenger Department of Railroads—Vast Sums That Have Been Expended for This Purpose Bearing Fruit.

The amount of land taken during the last twelve months in Minnesota and North Dakota along the Great Northern line is indicated by a statement issued by the Great Northern, giving the receipts of the various United States land offices in the Northwest. The receipts, which include income from all sources, including sales of land, pre-emption and homestead fees are as follows: Devils Lake, N. D., \$181,896; Minot, N. D., \$246,265.55; Duluth, \$26,521.40; Crookston, \$139,586.71; Grand Forks, \$85,510.82; Fargo, \$40,814.76; St. Cloud, \$27,606.81; Marshall, Minn., \$3,124.

A large proportion of the settlers have been persuaded to make their homes in the great Northwest through the efforts of the passenger department of the Great Northern passenger and immigration departments.

SWEDES GO TO CALIFORNIA. Party Leaves Here to Join Colony at Turlock in That State.

A party of seven families, all Scandinavian, comprising about thirty grown persons and several children left St. Paul yesterday for California where they are to join a Swedish colony at Turlock. This town, in the heart of a fine fruit country, was recently settled by a party of Swedes and Swedes and Eastern states. The settlers are taking up land in the vicinity of the town, and are developing it into a fruit country of the same type as the one in Sweden.

DEPARTMENT REORGANIZED. President Mellen, of Northern Pacific, Changes Duties of Commissioner.

President C. S. Mellen, of the Northern Pacific, has issued a circular announcing that the tax and right of way and lease departments are to be abolished and that the department of real estate, right of way and taxes is to be substituted. This department is to have charge of all the real estate and right of way matters of the company, excepting the land grants; all matters of right of way, now held or to be hereafter acquired, all leases of real estate, including leases of right of way; taxes on all property including those of the land grant; all real estate, rights of way, leases and taxes of other companies operated by the Northern Pacific.

HOMESEEKERS COMING FAST. Railroads Carried Nearly 50,000 in September and October.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Between 40,000 and 50,000 people are expected to leave for the Northwestern and Western states during September and October. The number of people who have left Chicago has never been so great in the history of Western railroads. During the present week, which is the last week of the Pacific coast, the railroads will carry 20,000 colonists out of Chicago, St. Paul, St. Louis and other cities in the Middle West. The Santa Fe will carry at least 2,000 persons to the Pacific coast, having been for seventy-five cars thus far.

HARRIMAN TO BUILD STEAMERS. Orders to Be Given for Four Mammoth Vessels for the Pacific.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—The Record Herald tomorrow will disclose the management of the Harriman lines are preparing to make a vigorous campaign for increased tonnage traffic through the Pacific coast. With this end in view, orders will be given for building four mammoth steamships to ply between Portland and Oriental ports. Their cost will be between \$10,000,000 and \$12,000,000 each, and their tonnage will be as large as those building for the Hill lines.

Wife Murderer Sentenced. OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 28.—Judge Baxter in the district court has sentenced Anton Christenson to life imprisonment for the murder of his wife on Aug. 25.
