

FAILURE FOR SHAFER

HIS CHARGES AGAINST GOMPERS WILL FALL TO THE GROUND

Investigating Committee of the Federation of Labor Will Report Today, Exonerating the President—Whole Day Devoted to the Work of Patching Up the Differences Between the Carpenters.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 19.—The special committee appointed to consider the charges made by President Shaffer of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, against President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, will report to-morrow. The investigation will terminate in the exoneration of President Gompers and will have a termination of the wet fire cracker class. President Shaffer has not been found to substantiate his charges, but a member of the committee is authority for the statement that he has never made any statement to that body at least. He has appeared before the committee and when he came away declared he had presented his charges. The committee says he did not formulate them. In the absence of direct accusation there can be but one end to the investigation.

THE CARPENTERS' BATTLE

The chief fight of the day came in the old struggle between the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners and the Amalgamated Association of Carpenters. The former organization asked for the re-election of President of the latter because of alleged practices contrary to the interests of the trade union movement. Its avowed object being to re-elect the other organization into its own ranks. After several hours of debate the matter was referred to a commission of eleven, five from each order and James Lynch, umpire to be mutually selected. The commission is to meet on or before March 1, 1903, and endeavor to bring about an amalgamation of the two organizations. No promise was made, however, by either organization that the amalgamation would be made. All hostility was to cease pending the meeting of the commission.

ATCHISON, Kan., Nov. 19.—Judge Hudson, in the court today, will hold the new absentee railway employees' law permitting railroad men to vote when away from home on election day. BUDGET FOR 1903

FIRST ITEM.

Interest Fund. For interest on bonded debt. \$355,515. For interest on tax levy certified. 65,576. For interest on Park Loans. 1,354. Less amount to be paid by Water Board. 110,570. Balance. \$311,875. Of which there are miscellaneous receipts, if the Council so agree. 61,575. Tax estimate. \$250,000.

SECOND ITEM.

Sinking Fund. Under existing circumstances it does not seem necessary to make any provision for this fund for the year 1903, as there will be a balance of about \$300,000 on hand, \$27,400 of which is invested in Minnesota Loan Certificates maturing June 1, 1902. It can be safely estimated that on July 1, 1902, there will be about \$400,000 cash in this fund to apply towards the bonds that come due at that time.

THIRD ITEM.

Redemption Fund. Obligations maturing in 1903 will be as follows: April 2, 1903, \$20,000 bonds for Sixth Ward Levee opening. April 2, 1903, \$20,000 bonds for constructing High School building. May 1, 1903, \$20,000 bonds for construction of sewer. July 1, 1903, \$20,000 bonds for purchase of Cato Park. Sept. 1, 1903, \$50,000 bonds for construction of sewers. July 1, 1902, \$4,700 for Park Loan No. 5. Making a total of \$197,200. Under the law which governs the redemption of the same, we can refund an amount less than \$100,000. We would therefore recommend that \$90,000 be refunded, \$60,000 be placed in this budget for Redemption Fund, and the balance, \$30,000, be put out of the Sinking Fund. Two bonds of \$1,000 each, have been bought up by the Sinking Fund Committee about two months ago, leaving the above amount to be met next year.

FOURTH ITEM.

Fire Department Fund. Estimated expenditures for Fire Department purposes. \$215,000. Of which there are to be paid out of the Miscellaneous Receipts of the

city, if the Council shall so agree. 35,000.

FIFTH ITEM.

Police Department Fund. Estimated expenditures for Police Department purposes. \$185,000. Of which there are to be paid out of the miscellaneous receipts, if the Council shall so agree. 35,000.

SIXTH ITEM.

Lighting Fund. On the basis of the present contract prices the lighting of the city, exclusive of the outlying farms, would cost for one year as follows: 2,500 Incandescent Gas Lamps at \$29.00. \$73,370.00. 2,300 Incandescent Gasoline Lamps at \$20.00. 46,000.00. 375 Arc Electric Lights at \$90.00. 33,750.00. 82 Arc Electric underpans at \$110.00. 9,020.00. 7 Park Arcs at \$64.16 per m. 449.92. 26 Arcs (Harriet Island) \$200.00. 5,200.00. 75 Incandescent Gasoline (Harriet Island) (5 mos.) 810.00. Total. \$177,996.50. For the year 1903 it is estimated that new lamps will be demanded as follows: 50 Incandescent Gas Lamps at \$29.00. \$1,450.00. 100 Incandescent Gasoline Lamps at \$25.92. 2,592.00. 375 Arc Electric Lights at \$110.00. 41,250.00. Total. \$45,292.00. Tax estimate. \$185,350.00.
