

SEEKS TO ABOLISH PRIVATE CAR PLAN

J. W. MIDGELY ENDEAVORING TO HAVE RAILROADS ABOLISH SYSTEM

WOULD MEAN A SAVING ANNUALLY OF \$9,000,000

Railroad Officials Are Inclined to Favor the Proposition, but Think That Individual Roads Would Continue Taking Private Cars in Order to Get Freight.

J. W. Midgely, commissioner for the Western car mileage bureau, whose investigations of the savings of railroads that would result from a change from the car mileage basis to the per diem system, was followed recently by the plan being adopted, is now endeavoring to do away with the practice of railroads handling cars owned by private concerns. He has been in St. Paul the last few days endeavoring to interest local officials in the project, and he reports that so far he has succeeded very well. He is making a crusade against the use by railroads of the cars of the Standard Oil company, the Union Tank line and packers' refrigerators, manufacturers' cars, coal cars and many other less important.

\$9,000,000 Might Be Saved Yearly. Mr. Midgely claims that with the abolition of the private car system about \$9,000,000 would be saved annually. This sum is now, he says, sacrificed to the cupidity of private car owners.

Railway officials here yesterday agreed that this figure is not too large and were generally inclined to look favorably upon the project. Mr. Midgely has already convinced many railroads of the reason in his position, and they will immediately take steps to abolish the system.

The only difficulty in the way, it is acknowledged, rests in the fact that individual railroads will probably always be willing to contract to handle private cars to get the freight which would go with them.

SANTA FE TO BUILD NEW LINE.

Roas 265 Miles With Branches Will Be Constructed in New Mexico.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 18.—President E. F. Ripley, of the Santa Fe, and his associates have incorporated the Santa Fe Railway in New Mexico. The charter is for fifty years. It is intended to construct a line from a point near La Junta, Colo., to the mouth of the Colorado river, and easterly to Valencia and Guadalupe counties, N. M. The route will connect with the Peccos Valley & Northeastern at or near Texico on the eastern New Mexico boundary. The total length of the line will be 265 miles. Branch lines will be constructed also. Headquarters of the new line will be in Los Angeles. It is estimated the new line will require one year to build. The route will give to the Santa Fe two separate routes between Chicago and Los Angeles and shorten the route to the westland trains to San Francisco to twelve hours less time than at present.

TRAINMEN ARE RAISED.

Four Hundred on Peoria & St. Louis Receive Increase of 10 to 15 Per Cent.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec. 18.—Curtis Millard, general manager of the Peoria & St. Louis, today stated that conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen of his road will receive the standard scale of wages for their respective work, beginning with the new year. This amounts to an increase of from 10 to 15 cents per 100 miles, and for brakemen \$1.30 per 100. The conductors will now receive \$3.25 per 100 and brakemen \$2.

TO GRADE THROUGH MOUNTAINS.

Denver and Continental Divide.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 18.—Contracts were let today for the grading of thirty-six miles of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific in the mountains between Denver and the projected tunnel through the crest of the continental divide. The work of this nature on the road is heavier and more expensive than any other portion of the line between Denver and Salt Lake City. The contracts let today call for cash payments amounting to \$1,000,000. Work is to be begun within ten days.

THERE'S NO WAY OUT OF WEARING CLOTHES

OPERATORS ARE DOING A BIGGER BUSINESS THAN EVER

Chief Cochran, of Postoffice Inspectors, Says There's No Way of Stamping Out the Game as Long as the Yearly Crop of "Suckers" Continues.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18.—Green goods operators are still active, in spite of the fact that the postoffice inspectors during the past three months have arrested more persons engaged in the unlawful business than during any preceding period of six months. This fact does not deter them from working the game, so the postoffice authorities want the laws made more rigid for the complete wiping out of the industry. Postmaster General Payne has asked congress to make it unlawful for the telegraph companies to forward messages of those working the green goods dodge. The mails are never used for this purpose, except for the sending out of the original circulars. If any one becomes interested in the scheme of getting money at about 15 cents on the dollar he is directed to conduct his correspondence by telegraph. Instructions are given as to the point to which messages shall be sent, and in this way the law against using the United States mail for fraudulent purposes is avoided.

Only one of the two big telegraph companies is used by green goods men, and this company protects the operators as much as possible. That is to say, its officers never advise the postal authorities of the transmission of green goods telegrams. Although this protection, does not violate the postal rules, the postoffice inspectors follow up every case they hear of and make arrests and prosecutions where the evidence warrants it. William E. Cochran, chief of the postoffice inspectors, says there is no way of stamping out the green goods game as long as the yearly crop of "suckers" continues. In spite of all the publicity that has been given to the methods of these men they find little difficulty in getting persons to bite at their bait. Mr. Cochran says that nineteen of those who try to buy good money for practically nothing are arrested every year. In spite of the fact that the man thinks he can outwit the sharpers at their game, but he invariably falls.

"The only man I knew who beat the green goods men at their tricks," said Chief Cochran today, "was a big Texan. Just as the exchange of the good money was being made for the gold brick he pulled his pistol and killed one of the operators. He was tried for murder and was acquitted."

INDIANA TO HAVE A LARGE ARTIFICIAL WATERWAY

Million Dollar Project to Reclaim Big Tract of Marsh Lands.

CROWN POINT, Ind., Dec. 18.—Preliminary steps are under way in the northwest counties of Indiana to erect what will be the largest artificial waterway of its kind east of the Mississippi river. When completed it will reclaim hundreds of thousands of acres of Kankakee marsh lands which are now worthless. A contract has been let for the first fourteen miles in La Porte and Stark counties for \$1,350,000. The ditch will be four feet wide and sixteen inches deep. It is the plan of the other counties to continue the great ditch to the mouth of the Kankakee. The project will be about \$1,000,000. The project has been taken up by farmers along the Kankakee. Payment is to be made from assessments of benefits arising from the ditch.
