

TRAINMEN INSIST ON 20 PER CENT PER CENT Representatives of Unions Declare That They Will Stand for Having Demands Granted—Various Compromises are Offered by Different Roads.

A report circulated by an evening paper to the effect that the Northern Pacific had made an offer of 10 per cent to the committee of conductors and brakemen who are negotiating for a 20 per cent increase has been denied.

Officers of compromises have been made to the committee, with one exception, but the representatives of the unions state positively that no compromise will be accepted.

The report that the Northern Pacific had made a 10 per cent offer probably originated from a plan of settlement suggested by the committee at yesterday morning's conference.

The Great Northern committee were also in conference yesterday. Supt. George A. Goodell made a proposition to the men which would practically amount to an advance of 10 per cent.

The negotiations between Supt. Treaboh, of the Omaha, and the committee have been postponed till Friday or Saturday.
