The bed clothes of the two negroes were found to be soaked with blood and a leg burned off.

Eighty-one Million Dollar Improvement for Erie Canal... New York Legislature.

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The anticipated eighty-one-million-dollar canal improvement bill was introduced in both houses of the legislature tonight. The bill provides for the so-called "inside Oneida, Seneca-Mohawk route," and authorizes the issue of \$10,000,000 of bonds at 3 percent deviation for eighteen years.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE "STOP THIEF SOCIETY" HANDSOME WOMAN WHO ENTERTAINED LAVISHLY WHILE IN EUROPE.

QUEER OLD ORGANIZATION HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING IN MAINE. LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 14.—Mrs. Chaucey, whose engagement to Lord Rosebery is announced, was before her marriage to the late Samuel Sloan Chaucey, of New York, Miss Alice Carr and was known as one of the most beautiful women in Louisville, where she spent the greater portion of her girlhood. Her father, John Chaucey, of Pittsburg, was a young man, married Lord Newborough, of England, whom she met while on a cruise with Mrs. Chaucey in the Mediterranean sea. After the death of Mr. Chaucey, his wife went abroad and purchased a "chateau" in France, where she entertained with lavish hospitality. Last winter Mrs. Chaucey was presented at the English court by the Countess of Newborough. Both Mrs. Chaucey and Lady Newborough were born in a small town in Southern Illinois.

BRIDGEPORT, Me., Jan. 14.—The "Stop Thief society," one of the oldest organizations of the country, has just finished its annual meeting here. It is a relic of the times when horse stealing was the same category with murder, although in Maine capital punishment was not meted out then any more than it is now for the most serious offense.

The only other "society" for apprehending horse thieves" at Dedham, Mass., which had women among its members. The Maine society was organized in 1814, and for many years has been more of a social organization, and the "riders" are not called upon for active service.

The president of the society of George E. Parbox, of Bangor, Me., who is a member of the society, to go in pursuit of thieves or felons.

It is also provided that each rider shall keep himself furnished with a good and effective horse and at all times hold himself in readiness upon due notice being given him by any member or by the president, that a larceny has been committed against the property or person of a member, or the family of, or the person of, a relative being in the family of a member of the society, to go immediately in pursuit of the thief or felon, and make all reasonable and practicable efforts to find and apprehend the same.

There are other provisions of the constitution of this society, and the powers of officers and members.

One of them is that any member who orders the riders in pursuit of a thief or felon, which is the duty of the officer, if caught, and bring him to justice; failing to do which he shall pay all expenses incurred by the society in the affair, and also pay 10 percent of the value of all property recovered, and of any compensation received on account of the case.

The riders cannot be ordered out if the offense is committed outside of the society's limits.

What may be termed the "coat of arms" of this society is a picture of an elephant which holds by its trunk a banner with the device, "Stop, Thief!" and wears a blanket of a member of the society, to go immediately in pursuit of the thief or felon, and make all reasonable and practicable efforts to find and apprehend the same.

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
