CONGRESSMEN FROM IOWA RAISE UP AN UNLAWFUL SCANDAL  
It Arises in Connection With a Bill to Pay the Claim of a Keokuk Firm—Records of a Fraud Investigation That Never Were Printed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 16.—The house devoted the day to private war claims, passing about twenty. The two features of the day were the defeat of a claim of B. F. Moody & Co., of Keokuk, Iowa, for the payment of the amount deducted from the contract for furnishing equipment to the Third Iowa cavalry by the famous commission cavalry which unearthed the army contract frauds in St. Louis in 1863, and the flight of Mr. Payne, the floor leader of the majority, against an omnibus resolution to refer ninety Southern claims, aggregating \$400,000, for stores and supplies taken by the army during the Civil war to the court of claims for finding of fact under the Tucker act.

An interesting controversy arose in connection with the bill to appropriate \$5,444 to pay the claim of B. F. Moody & Co., of Keokuk, Iowa, for balance due under a contract for the equipment of the Third Iowa cavalry during the Civil war, and sensational chapters in the history of the alleged contract frauds in St. Louis were exposed.

Reduced Four-Fifths.  
Mr. Smith (Iowa) was in charge of the bill. The original amount of the claim exceeded \$50,000, but it was reduced down by the committee to \$8,446.

Mr. Smith contended that the claim was just, the amount having been executed under the authority of agent, Gen. Cyrus Innes, who was Mr. Hedge (Iowa), Mr. Smith's colleague, denounced the claim with a vigor which attracted the attention of the entire house.

He impeached it on the ground that it had been allowed to slumber for thirty years without being presented to congress and then pointed out that it had originated in the action of the famous commission cavalry of David Davis, Hugh Campbell and Joseph Holt, which unearthed the alleged frauds in St. Louis in 1863.

Mr. Smith, in reply, while admitting that the contract might have been technically without authority, insisted that the claim was not fraudulent in law or in fact. The house voted the bill down, 29 to 70.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 16.—Representative Fitzgerald, of New York, introduced a bill to encourage, promote and to develop, as the title says, "the merchant marine of the United States."

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 16.—The house committee on industrial arts and exhibits today authorized a favorable report on the bill appropriating \$100,000 for an agricultural exhibit at the Louisiana purchase exposition at St. Louis.

CHICAGO, Jan. 16.—Congress is asked by the National League of Commission Merchants to pass a law granting more power to the interstate commerce commission to enforce its findings. A resolution to this effect was adopted by the league at the closing meeting held here today.
