THE LATEST X-RAY CURES

Therapeutic Value of the Roentgen Discovery Now Admitted by the Highest Authorities.

Special to The Globe. CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 17. — The very satisfactory results recently secured in this city in the treatment of lupus vulgaris by the X-rays disclose a new and highly useful field for the application of this as yet little utilized discovery. Four cases brought to the attention of the Academy of Medicine, in one case the exhibit or photographs showing the almost complete removal of scars of fourteen years' duration, after three exposures. The young girl operated on was sixteen years of age. She was the daughter of well-to-do parents and was of extremely comely appearance but for the disfiguring scars the size of about two silver dollars which covered the larger part of her left cheek with a deep red blotch. The patient was first treated in February, 1902. The portion of the face affected then was diffusely red, covered with scales and superficial crusts and studded with numerous red points and suppurating wounds. The lupus first made its appearance when the child was two years of age. The first treatment given extended over a period of five minutes, followed by another, three days later, continuing for eight minutes. The result of this case to date is that, after the first exposure reaction resulted, followed by so great an improvement that in August only a slight amount of the disease remained, which was particularly about the borders, areas that were shielded from X-ray action by the sheets of lead and tinfoil used to protect the surrounding normal areas. Two subsequent exposures were made, one of five minutes' duration, in September, and another of seven minutes' in the month following. All the more repulsive features of the disease have already disappeared. A complete and permanent cure of lupus vulgaris was made in another case. The patient, aged twenty-nine years, was affected with an area of lupus vulgaris over the right temple, of fifteen years' duration, which had been exercised and the defect covered with a Krouse flap, taken from the thigh, in 1898 and again in 1899, it re-

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disappeared, but the patient grew weaker and eventually died of violent general sepsis. The pathological report on this case was that the X-rays did not call to destroy malignant growths beneath the skin, but it is also demonstrated that there is a great danger to life by such rapid destruction. The report read: "It may, with some justice, be claimed that the treatment was too rapid. It is true the advanced stage of the disease when the method was first employed, absolutely demanded rapid action. Possibly, had not such been the case, and a slower, more intermittent treatment been possible, no such dire final result would have been attained, for the system might have been able to throw off the septic decaying tissues or substances more gradually. At the present time it is practical to make instantaneous pictures of the organs in the human chest, provided Pupin's idea of employing fluorescent screens in contact with the photographic plate is used. The equipment for these examinations and treatment is very complete at the present time, and the treatment of tuberculosis by means of X-rays has now become a common occurrence. The method of treatment most common is performed by placing the nude body in a sitting posture in an ample sized cabinet. Behind and in front of the body, projecting within the cabinet, are powerful, specially wound voltaic arc lamps. Upon this cabinet, and separated from it, is a sliding dome to contain the head of the patient. In this dome is placed a diffuse ozonating arc of remarkable construction. The arc is connected with a compound combination amplifying apparatus in one end of the cabinet, distinct from the space occupied by the body. From the amplifying certain wires run to a ducting interior, without terminal wires wiring or plates. When the apparatus is in operation the body of the patient is flooded with extremely rich actinic light. The body being nude permits of the rays not only bombarding the surface, but of penetrating through the epidermis into the blood corpuscles passing beneath. That they do this is proven by the increase of haemoglobin and the rapid increase of the corpuscular elements. The protection afforded to the head from the intense light with which the nude body is agitated is partly intended to insure the safety of the eyesight. During the operation the air breathed is heavily charged with free ozone, or, if preferred, with formal ozone, or eucalyptone. Whichever of these is preferred the element is in such gaseous form that it can enter wherever air can penetrate. This is immensely more advantageous to the consumptive than the use of vapor inhalations, because vapor-laden air cannot enter into the deeper lying disease of the lung tissues, only the gaseous substances being able to do this. A very remarkable phenomenon is shown whenever a local application is made. The conductive interior becomes brilliantly luminous and ozone in its most powerful tri-atomic form is forced into the tissues, remaining in situ, in nascent form to liberate free oxygen at any point toward which it is directed. Already very gratifying results have been obtained by this means in pulmonary tuberculosis and in cancerous growths where the disease has only reached the first stage favorable results are easily obtained. After a treatment of from ten days to three weeks blood examinations reveal a notable increase in the number of red and white corpuscles, which are often multiplied several times. There is a marked increase of haemoglobin. The sputum is thinned and decreased in volume, and finally the tubercle bacilli entirely one of the surrounding tissues. Therapeutic authorities believe that the exact mode by which the action of the X-rays benefits the patient is due to some electro-chemical action on the healthy cells or cell contents, causing an active though non-infectious inflammatory condition that ultimately results in a marked improvement in the circulation and of the surrounding tissues. Verified experiments thus far show that most promising and satisfactory results have been obtained in cases of superficial new growths, like the epidermoid cancers. They have also been safely and advantageously used in cases of cancer of the breast. Finally the result of all the reports thus far to hand, from both domestic and foreign sources, justifies the assertion that the Roentgen rays we have the promise of an active curative agent in the disease of the lung tissues, carcinoma and consumption. In addition to the complaints enumerated, the X-rays have been used as a

Bel that Called Columbus.

There is a bell at Washington whose history dates back to the very beginning of modern civilization on this continent. It is a trifling affair as regards size, its dimensions being only 3 by 6 1/2 inches; yet its notes sounded to call the great discoverer, Columbus, to prayer and sacred worship.
