SAYS DR. OHAGE HAS NO AUTHORITY UNDER LAW

Daniel W. Lawler Makes a Point in the Young Case That There Is No Legal Department of Health in St. Paul--Problem Will Be Considered by Judge Hine.

A point raised by Attorney D. W. Lawler as to the legality of the board of health may result in the discharge of C. W. Young, the osteopath, who had a hearing in police court yesterday on a charge of violating the quarantine law.

The charge was preferred by Health Commissioner Ohage, being the result of Dr. Young's treatment of the children of Thomas Poucher, while the latter's house was quarantined for diphtheria. It was charged that Dr. Young, not being a licensed practitioner, had no authority to enter the premises so long as they were under quarantine.

After a number of witnesses had been examined, and it had been shown beyond doubt that Dr. Young had entered the residence while it was under quarantine, that he had treated the children suffering from diphtheria, and that he had no license to practice medicine in Minnesota, the commissioner asked that the case be dismissed on the ground that the health department had no authority to make or enforce rules regulating contagious diseases.

Mr. Lawler contended that St. Paul had no board of health, but a health department, while the statute under which Young was prosecuted is a county "board of health" the charge of quarantine measures.

"There is hereby established an executive department in the municipal government of the city of St. Paul, Minn., which shall be known as the department of health, and shall embrace the commissioner of health, the chief of police, the corporation attorney and such other assistants and employees as are hereinafter provided for."

Attorney Lawler argued that this department of health had never held a meeting, never organized, had no records and no secretary.

Says Ohage Has No Authority. "It is urged on behalf of the defendant," said Mr. Lawler, "that Dr. Ohage, the commissioner of health, has no authority independent of this department of health to establish rules and regulations governing the quarantining of contagious diseases, and while the greatest respect and admiration is expressed for Dr. Ohage, the conduct of his office and the work upon which it is engaged, and no criticism is in the least degree intimated in that regard, it is claimed that he is not authorized to be subjected to a criminal prosecution for the violation of rules of the health department, those rules must be shown to have been adopted by the health department as constituted by the charter, and not merely by one member of that department."

It is also claimed by Mr. Lawler that there is no board of health within the contemplation of the statutes of the state which authorize boards of health to forbid any person except medical attendants and religious advisers visiting premises quarantined for contagious diseases.

Mr. Lawler contended that the defendant was a medical attendant within the meaning of the statute, for the reason that the term "medical attendant" cannot be construed to mean licensed physicians alone, but included others, such as nurses, druggists, mid-

RULES FOR LENT ARE LAID DOWN BY THE CHURCH

Archbishop Ireland Will Cause the Lenten Regulations to Be Promulgated in Every Catholic Church in Diocese Today--Exhorts Faithful to Practice Self Denial.

Next Wednesday is the first day of the Lenten season, and the regulations of the Roman Catholic church, as prescribed by Archbishop Ireland, will this morning be promulgated in all the churches of the diocese as follows:

In this year of grace, 1903, Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, will be the 26th day of February.

All the faithful, unless legitimately excused or dispensed, are bound in conscience, under the penalty of grievous sin, to observe the Lenten regulations.

The Lenten Fast. All the days of Lent, the Sundays excepted, are fast days.

The precept of fasting restricts the use of food to one meal towards the middle of the day, and a collation in the evening, not to exceed the fourth part of an ordinary meal--custom, however, authorizing the taking in the morning of a cup of coffee, tea or chocolate, with a small piece of bread.

Theologians allow for the collation of solid food to the amount of eight ounces. The solid food taken in the morning should not exceed two ounces.

When the meal or principal repast cannot be taken without serious inconvenience towards the middle of the day, the order of repasts may be reversed.

The use of fish meat is allowed at all meals on Sundays, and at the principal meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except the Saturday of Ember week (March 7) and the Saturday of Holy week (April 11).

The use of flesh meat is forbidden on Wednesdays, Fridays, the Saturday of Ember week and the Saturday of Holy week; on other days, outside of Sundays, it is forbidden on fast days, except the one meal principal repast.

The use of lard, however, is permitted at all times in the preparation of food.

Both fish and flesh meat cannot be taken at the same meal, even on Sundays.

Persons legitimately excused or dispensed from the precept of fasting may use flesh meat at all meals on what-ever day there is general permission to use it at the principal repast.

From the precept of fasting are excused those under the age of twenty-one years or over the age of sixty; the infirm and the convalescent; women bearing or nursing children; those engaged in hard labor or other duties of physical strength; those who from poverty are unable to procure for the principal repast a sufficient quantity of nutritive food.

From the precept of abstinence from flesh meat are excused: The young, under the age of seven years; the sick; those who are so situated as not to be able to procure for themselves abstinence food.

Special Exemption for "Working People." In virtue of the authority conceded to bishops in the United States by a recent official indult, permission is granted to "working people" to use meat on all days of Lent, with the exception of Fridays, Ash Wednesday, the Wednesday and the Saturday of Holy week.

This dispensation from abstinence extends to all three repasts in the day. The usual prohibition remains against the use of both fish and flesh meat at the same meal.

Where the wage earner, in virtue of the indult, uses meat, all the members of the household may use it. The church does not wish to impose upon the household the inconvenience of double cooking. But in cases of this kind, those members of the household who may be bound by the precept of fasting are allowed the use of meat only at their principal repast.

The sovereign pontiff exhorts all who may make use of the privileges of the indult to be still mindful of their duty to practice self-denial, and he counsels that instead of the abstinence from meat, some other sacrifice of bodily comfort be practiced, such as the sovereign pontiff himself suggesting, such as sacrifice, abstinence from intoxicating drinks.

The devotion of the way of the cross will be observed, if at all possible, in all the churches and chapels on the Friday evenings throughout Lent.

During Lent pastors will hold special exercises of devotion in their several churches at appointed times. Instructions of a practical character upon the Christian duties, the nature of the sacraments, and the preparation for their reception, should be given on those occasions of scandal, and is not accepted as a practical Catholic.

Let Catholics, therefore, have the courage of self-denial for the sake of Christ and of their own souls and be upon their guard lest by their acts scandal be given, and the fair name of their religion be dishonored.
