I feel confident that after a talk with Fitz I can convince him that no better proposition than mine will be made for this match," said Herrmann. "Fort Erie is the only place in the East where the fight can be pulled off without interference, and O'Brien accepted my terms two days ago. It is now up to Fitz to know that Bob wants to go to California, but they will not be able to get as much money there as I have offered. I am ready to give \$10,000 for the contest, and if Fitz accepts I will be on deck Tuesday in New York to post my forfeit."


