**URNS TABLES ON TOWN MARSHAL**

**George Solseth Disarms Him for Acting Without a Warrant.**

That George Solseth is occupying a cell in the new county jail, charged with passing bad checks in St. Paul a year ago, is no fault of the marshal at Watson, a small town in Chippewa county.

Solseth has been wanted in St. Paul for some time to answer to a charge of forgery, and when he was recently located on his brother's farm, six miles from Watson, a telegram was sent to the village marshal instructing him to hold the man until officers from this city arrived. The marshal drove out to the farm and is said to have informed Solseth in a very officious manner that he was under arrest.

"What am I charged with?" asked Solseth.

"It's none of your business; you come with me," replied the town marshal, and when the alleged forger demanded to see a warrant, or be informed why he was being arrested, the marshal is said to have pulled a large gun on Solseth.

The gun played the village marshal's undoing. Instead of submitting to the demands of the officer, Solseth knocked the gun to the ground, picked it up, and covering the officer, informed him that he would place him under arrest for pointing a gun at him. The exhortations of the marshal were of no avail, and he was compelled by Solseth to get into his buggy and drive to Montevideo, thirty miles away. Solseth accompanied him, retaining possession of the gun. At Montevideo Solseth placed the marshal in the custody of the sheriff, charging him with drawing a gun on him.

Before Solseth took his departure the sheriff placed him under arrest, having learned from the Watson marshal that he was wanted in St. Paul. After giving the marshal some good advice about overstepping his authority in attempting to make arrests, the sheriff allowed the man to return to his home at Watson.

The St. Paul authorities were notified and Detective Sweeney went after Solseth, returning to St. Paul with his prisoner yesterday. Solseth is charged with passing two worthless checks on M. Shapiro, a St. Paul jeweler, a year ago. When arraigned yesterday afternoon he pleaded not guilty and will be given a preliminary hearing April 10.

The bids were tabulated and turned over to the school board and the contracts will be awarded by it.

**INSURANCE CONCERN ACCUSED OF QUEER METHODS**

**D. P. Gray, Local Agent of Kansas City Home Co-operative Company, Is Apprehended Doing Life Insurance Business Without a License.**

D. P. Gray, local agent of the Home Co-operative company, a Kansas City concern, was arrested yesterday afternoon at his office in the Chamber of Commerce building, charged with doing a life insurance business without a license. Mr. Gray is the successor of Earl D. Beardsley, who was arrested upon a similar charge some months ago and who recently paid the fine assessed against him, the supreme court affirming the decision of the lower court which found Beardsley guilty.

County Attorney Kane refused to consent to Mr. Gray being allowed his liberty on his own recognizance, and the bail was fixed at \$500, which Mr. Gray was unable to secure until after he had been in jail for some time. Late last night he secured bondsmen and was released from custody.

According to County Attorney Kane the concern represented by Mr. Gray has collected thousands of dollars from the poorer class of people of St. Paul and vicinity, and it is stated that there is little opportunity for these investors to realize one cent on the money which they have been paying into the concern for months past, with the expectation of finally securing a home of their own.

County Attorney Explains.

"I have investigated the workings of this company and no legitimate business could possibly be conducted the way these people pretend to do business," said Mr. Kane last night. "They held out inducements to poor and ignorant people that could never be fulfilled. Of late numerous complaints have been made to this office by patrons of the institution who have been placing all of their spare money into the scheme and now begin to realize that they are to get nothing out of it."

"The charge of doing a life insurance business without a license, is simply a technical charge," said Mr. Kane, "and if the case ever comes to trial, it will make some startling exposure."

"J. P. Lenard is one of the many hundreds of St. Paul people who have invested in the company's contracts. He bought three contracts and paid \$120 for them. When he became suspicious he tried to dispose of his holdings, and offered to sell them back to the company for \$20, but could not do so. We will show that the company has no assets and that the business it is transacting is nothing more than a wildcat business."

The company's scheme was to sell contracts to poor people who desired to own homes. The party would pay \$1.50 per month for a certain length of time, after which they were to be given a home. In the event they failed to secure a home, the contract had matured, his heirs were to be given the home without any more payments.

Company's Queer Methods.

The company's methods of doing business were recently investigated in the federal court at Kansas City, and some queer financing was brought to light. It was proved by the company's own correspondence that the company was operated by its officers that the Home Co-operative company was organized without capital. The first five officers of these officers drew a salary of \$3,400 a year each. An interest in the business was recently sold to St. Louis parties for \$9,000.

It was admitted by George A. Nell, president of the concern, that the company had drawn \$200,000 from the public to meet current expenses, and that when the company sold out an interest in the business last December, he was insolvent and would have failed had not a purchaser been found in St. Louis who agreed to put \$100,000 in the business.

The investigation by the federal authorities at Kansas City showed that the methods of doing business were very irregular and that wildcat contracts were numbered up in the thousands, there were always low-numbered contracts to be had, which were offered to purchasers who desired contracts which would mature early.

Mr. Kane stated last night that the St. Paul branch of the company had done a thriving business, and that thousands of dollars had been paid into the concern.

The assets of the company in this state are said to consist of a desk and some office furniture at the company's headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce building.

**SOO ASKS RIGHT TO TUNNEL THREE STREETS**

**Company Also Petitions Assembly for Permission to Cross at Grade a Number of Thoroughfares in Line of Proposed Extension of Road.**

In the proposition is the statement that a map of the proposed route of the Soo's new tracks is attached, but it is stated that it could not be located last night, probably will be withheld until the meeting of the committee on streets.

The streets the Soo line desires to tunnel are Mississippi, Westminster and Lafayette avenue, and this it supplements with a request for permission to cross at grade Hyacinth, Maryland, Minnehaha, Viningen, Pennsylvania and Bridge streets. The Soo also wants permission to place its tracks beneath the Cortland and Jessamine street bridges.

No Map in Sight.

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The company, in making known its wants, announces its willingness to pay all damages resulting to city property and to return the streets used to their original shape. Provision is also made to protect the tracks of the street car company.
