

PEARSON WANTS TO BE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT OF NORTHERN PACIFIC

Word was received yesterday at the office of the Chicago system, Western announcing a theatrical rate of 1 1/2 cents a mile for parties of fifty or over. The rate will remain in effect until May 1.

It was reported at the general offices of the Northern Pacific yesterday that E. J. Pearson, assistant general superintendent of the road, has resigned to accept a position with one of the large Eastern systems.

No official announcement of Mr. Pearson's resignation was made, and it was denied by some of the officials that he contemplated leaving the Northern Pacific.

The announcement of Mr. Pearson's retirement from the Northern Pacific comes closely upon the official statement that M. C. Kimberly, general superintendent, is about to be transferred to the general manager's office and to be succeeded by F. W. Gilbert, the superintendent of the Idaho division.

Mr. Kimberly denied last night that he had any knowledge of Mr. Pearson's contemplated change and emphatically stated that he had not yet tendered his resignation.

It has been nothing of Mr. Pearson's resignation, said he, "and the report that he is going to another system is news to me."

Mr. Pearson has been in the employ of the Northern Pacific company for fifteen years. Up to a year ago he was superintendent of the Western division, with headquarters at Tacoma.

It was rumored about the general offices yesterday that Newman Kilne, the present superintendent of the Pacific division, will succeed Mr. Pearson.

Another rumor that has been circulated was that Mr. Kilne and Mr. Pearson would exchange positions, when Mr. Kimberly enters the general manager's office May 1.
