

AUTHOR OF FAMOUS ELKINS BILL SUED

Attorneys Claim West Virginia Senator Failed to Pay for Services Rendered in Assisting Him to Secure Control of the Western Maryland—Asks Court for \$500,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—Senator Stephen B. Elkins, of West Virginia, is made defendant in a suit at law for \$500,000, filed today in the district supreme court by Robert Burton and George A. Du Brueil.

The declaration in the case alleges that Senator Elkins employed the plaintiffs in November, 1901, to procure for him certain information, plans, data and legal opinions, concerning the Western Maryland, for the purpose of aiding him to acquire a controlling interest in that company.

He proposed to pay them for their services rendered him or his business associates in this matter, provided he obtained a controlling interest in the road.

The declarations aver that they accepted the employment on these conditions and from time to time furnished the defendant certain information at the expense of much time and great labor, and also transmitted him legal information, which assisted him in securing the controlling interest in the company.

When, however, they requested compensation for their services, Senator Elkins, it is stated, failed and neglected to pay them.

It is declared that after the Goulds had acquired the Western Maryland, Messrs. Burton and Du Brueil demanded their share, but that Senator Elkins refused to pay, although he had made millions out of the deal.

SETTLERS FLOCK TO CANADA.

Immigrants From British Isles Locate in Dominion.

Passenger traffic officials of the roads of the United States which handle large numbers of immigrants are watching the development of the plans for turning this tide in part toward the port-went provinces of Canada. One of the phases of development of the immigration problem which has been met in the United States, and solved in a measure, is just beginning to become prominent in Canada.

The great increase of immigrants to the United States during the present year is being equaled by the increase in the immigration to Canada. The total number of those seeking homes in the United States, of course, far exceeds those going into Canada, but the people leaving the British Isles are more and more going to the Dominion. Last year during the month of March 5,225 British immigrants settled in Canada and 1,425 came to the United States. During the corresponding month of the present year 12,864 of the immigrants from Great Britain went to Canada and 19,982 settled in the United States.

PASSENGER AGENTS MEET.

Trans-Continental Association Will Convene Today at Portland.

Many important subjects will be settled at today's meeting of the Trans-Continental Passenger Association, which convenes this morning at Portland, Or. The St. Paul party, including the general passenger agents of several lines, will arrive at Portland this morning and at 10 o'clock the session will be called at the Portland Hotel.

Most of the questions that will be discussed refer to the provisions of the Elkins bill, governing transportation matters. The general passenger agents also make detail arrangements for carrying the delegates to the National G. A. R. encampment at San Francisco in August.

Circuit rates to and from the Pacific coast towns will come up for final disposition and a new form of clergy tickets will be presented.

The next quarterly meeting will be held in St. Paul, as the association will hold one session yearly in St. Paul, at its St. Louis conference.

YELLOWSTONE TO OPEN EARLY.

Railroads Anticipate Large Tourist Traffic.

Yellowstone National Park will open June 1 this season, or fifteen days sooner than ever before in the history of the reservation.

Report that the park received at the general passenger department of the Northern Pacific are to the effect that the snow is rapidly melting and that within few weeks the ground will be clear. Already the city passenger department of the Northern Pacific has been flooded with inquiries regarding the excursion rates to the National Park.

This season promises to surpass anything we have ever before experienced in park excursions, said City Ticket Agent George Rogers of the Northern Pacific yesterday when discussing the outlook for the coming season. "Every day we receive applications regarding rates at the city department and I understand that the general passenger department is also flooded with inquiries.

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JAER MUST TESTIFY.

President of Reading Company to Tell of Coal Road Merger.

NEW YORK, April 20.—Acting upon the advice of Attorney General Knox, the interstate commerce commission has issued subpoenas for the testimony of James A. Jaer, president of the Reading company, who is also head of the Temple Iron company, has been served with a subpoena and will be called upon to tell of the status of the Temple Iron company controls the coal carrying roads.

Chicago, Chicago; vice-presidents, Thomas W. Deuel, Joliet; B. R. Clark, Racine, Wis.; J. L. Clifford, South Chicago, D. W. Richmond was elected president of the American Federation meeting at Boston.

Road Must Pay Damages. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—The United States supreme court today refused to reverse the decision of the circuit court of appeals for the Fifth circuit in the case of the Texas P-cific Railway company vs. Abe Behlmer. Behlmer was a brakeman, and was killed at the top of a freight car by a bump in coupling, caught his trousers on a nail and was badly hurt. He was awarded damages amounting to \$10,000. The railroad appealed, and the opinion of the court, said that a certain amount of bumping was to be expected in coupling cars, but that this could be prevented so that the trial court had not given due attention to the question of negligence.
