NEW YORK, April 25.—The estate of Marcus Daly, who died in 1890, has been appraised by the appraiser appointed by the surrogate for the assessment of the inheritance tax, and his report shows that Mr. Daly left personal property in this state of the net value of \$1,460,437. Mr. Daly's will was probated in Montana, where the bulk of his property was situated, and his entire property is valued at \$11,000,000.
