

President Attends Church at Sharon Springs, Kan.—Denver to Receive Next.

SHARON SPRINGS, Kan., May 3.—President Roosevelt attended the little Methodist church at this place today and listened to a most instructive sermon, preached by a Presbyterian minister, Rev. William Carter, of Kansas City, who came here for that purpose. A number of pastors from this neighborhood participated. A pleasing incident occurred as the services began. Two little girls were standing in the aisle near the president's pew. As soon as the president saw them he drew them into his pew, and during the singing the three shared the same hymn book. At the conclusion of the service the president shook hands with a large number of people. In the afternoon he went for a long horseback ride, accompanied by Senators Burton and Long and President Butler, of Columbia college. Senator Warren, of Wyoming, and Civil Service Commissioner Foulke joined the president here today. The town is full of strangers, who came here to see the president, some of them riding fifty miles for that purpose. A Sharon Springs admirer of the president presented to him today a two weeks' old badger. The little animal is as friendly as can be and will be taken home to Washington to join the growing menagerie of the Roosevelt children. DENVER READY TO RECEIVE. Streets Lavishly Decorated in Honor of the President. DENVER, Col., May 3.—Everything

is in readiness for the reception of President Roosevelt, who is due to arrive here at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning. Two and a half hours will be spent here, and during that time the president will deliver an address at the state capitol and will be driven through the business and residence sections and through the city parts. The streets through which he will pass have been lavishly decorated with flags and bunting and hundreds of pictures of President Roosevelt placed in conspicuous positions. Thousands of persons from over the state are here to see the president and a crowd tomorrow will be tremendous. President Roosevelt will cross the eastern border of Colorado before daylight and will make his first stop at Hugo, to be the guest of the Lincoln county cowmen for breakfast. There he will be joined by Gov. Peabody and a committee of Denver organizations, who will extend a welcome. The mayor has proclaimed Monday a holiday. A feature of the day will be the gathering of the school children at the city park.
