NORTHERN PACIFIC ISSUES CROP REPORT

First Review Published Yesterday Shows Farming Conditions in the Northwest Favorable—Season Opens Late in Some Districts—Grain Acreage Will be Increased.

The first weekly crop report for the 1903 season was issued yesterday by the freight department of the Northern Pacific. The reports will be issued every Monday throughout the summer.

Minnesota Division.—East of Staples the season is generally about average as last year, in some localities a little earlier and in some progressing rapidly, winter 90 per cent have been sown. Winter wheat acreage of about ten days in advance of last year. The ground is in splendid shape for crops of all kinds, owing to frequent rains.

Staples to Moorhead.—There was a slight decrease in the district between Moorhead and Appleton. There will be considerable increase in other grain, corn and potatoes. Planting is well under way.

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Little Falls and Dakota Division.—The season is ten days to two weeks later than last year, and is considered a backward spring. Seventy-five per cent of wheat is sown, but the acreage of winter wheat is not put in this week. Plowing for corn has been completed, and the acreage of corn is about ten days in advance of last year.

REV. NOBLE PALMER DIES AT SON'S RESIDENCE

Father of T. R. Palmer Passes Away at the Age of Eighty Years.

Rev. Noble Palmer died yesterday afternoon at the residence of his son, T. R. Palmer, 923 Grand avenue, where he had made his home for the past nine years.

Rev. Noble Palmer was born at Morris, Otsego county, N. Y., July 15, 1823. He was graduated from Trinity college and from the Theological seminary of the Protestant Episcopal church at New York, and was ordained a priest by Bishop Huntington of the diocese of Central New York in 1848.

He was married Aug. 22, 1848, to Amelia Ruggles, daughter of Timothy Ruggles, at Harpersville, Broome county, N. Y. Mrs. Palmer died Feb. 15, 1882, while her husband was in charge of St. James' parish, Buffalo, N. Y.

Of seven children born to Rev. Noble and his wife, seven now survive. Mrs. Charles J. Doolittle, Lake City, Minn.; Mrs. Alice Y. Whittemore, Ithaca, N. Y.; T. R. Palmer of this city; and Albert B. Palmer, of Montour Falls, N. Y.

Rev. Dr. Palmer devoted all of his active life to the service of his church, and in his forty-five years of ministerial work was pastor of several important parishes in New York. Nine years ago he gave up his ministerial work and came to St. Paul to reside with his son. He was strong and vigorous physically and mentally until about a year ago, when evidences of approaching dissolution appeared. In the past four months he has failed rapidly, and his death at this time was not unexpected.

Funeral services will be held at St. Paul's church, Montour Falls, N. Y., where the deceased officiated for many years, and the remains will be interred beside those of his wife and deceased children in Mount Carmel cemetery.

VETERANS ARRANGE FOR MEMORIAL DAY PARK BOARD PRODS STREET CAR COMPANY

Urges It to Promptly Extend Its Line to Phenian Park.

In order to hasten the opening of Phenian park the board of park commissioners has written to the street car company asking it to promptly extend its line to the park entrance.

Yesterday the board of public works opened bids for the grading of Forest street, a part of the route decided upon for the extension, and the contract was awarded to Thomas Linnen. The grading will cost \$7,172, against the engineer's estimate of \$5,868.

The park board has received word that the street car company is desirous of extending the extension another year, and the request for haste was to contract any such delay.
