

## ROOSEVELT WILL FIGHT HANNA FOR OHIO'S BACKING

### DEATH IS SCATTERED BY TORNADOES IN IOWA

Six Persons Killed and a Score Injured, Three Fatally—Property Losses Are Enormous—Worst Havoc Is at School for Feeble Minded—Almost Unprecedented Rainfall.

#### ELMO DESTROYED, SIX DEAD.

BLANCHARD, Iowa, May 26.—A tornado struck the town of Elmo, eight miles west of Blanchard and just across the Missouri Line, this afternoon, destroying the town. Six persons are known to have been killed and others injured. The storm struck a three-story brick hotel, which was entirely destroyed. Six bodies have been removed from the ruins of the building and others are believed to be buried in the debris. The names of those whose bodies were recovered are: C. C. CALHOUN, GUS DUFF, L. SUMMERS, WILLIAM DUFF, CHARLES BELL, D. L. PARKER.

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### MORE RUSSIAN JEWS MUST GO

Palaver About Punishing Those Responsible for Kishenev Butchery.

#### ST. PETERSBURG, May 26.—The

chief of police of Kieff has ordered the police commissaries within his jurisdiction to institute a fresh inquiry into the legal status of the Jews and to forcibly expel those who have no legal right of residence and who refuse to leave. A Jewish deputation from Kishenev recently had a long audience with Minister von Pichow. The latter declared being a Jewophile and said he had not opposed taking proceedings against the former governor of Kishenev, Gen. von Baaber, and the local administration of Kishenev. The minister promised sympathetic consideration of the facts set forth in the petition of the Jewish population for future protection. Consequently the minister yesterday suppressed the distribution of Krousteraus new anti-Semitic organ, the Zonamis.

#### The Russian laws do not permit

suits against the state for damages done by a mob, but the government can consent to the prosecution of negligent officials. It is not yet decided whether criminal procedure will be adopted. The incriminated officials have no property, hence the purpose is not to obtain pecuniary recompense, but it is hoped the moral effect of the prosecutions will prevent a repetition of the massacres.

### BERLIN IS EVEN MORE VICIOUS THAN EVER

So Hold Some Speakers at the Session of the Synod.

BERLIN, May 26.—An animated discussion took place tonight at the annual session of the Berlin synod on the deterioration of morals in this capital. Some of the speakers said the German capital had acquired an undesirable fame, having outrivalled even Paris in its unblushing vice, and if the police were unable to suppress the ever-increasing immorality, it became the duty of the church to endeavor to purify the homes of the people, the streets, theaters, literature and art.

#### Noted Forger Dies.

DENVER, Col., May 26.—Henry Renard, alias Henry L. Moody, who was under arrest on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, died today of pneumonia, aged seventy. He was one of the most noted forgers in this country.

#### Chicago Hotels May Close.

CHICAGO, May 26.—"Every hotel and restaurant in Chicago will be closed at once if the employees' union submits exorbitant demands tomorrow," said Joseph Bellini, proprietor of the Sherman house, today.

### "CHINK" LAUNDRYMEN FORM UNION

Visions of Still Greater Gains Dazzle Chicago Celestials, Whose Wages Have More Than Doubled.

CHICAGO, May 26.—And now it is the Chinese laundrymen who have a union. It is a real union, with better wages for its slogan and it carries with it a coming a fresh threat against the clean linen supply of the city. Hong Hai is its name, or something akin to that, and its meeting place is the curb along South Clark street, between Van Buren and Harrison streets. The wages earned by its almost-eyed members have been going up by jumps ever since the white "washers" girls and men went on strike the first of the month and at last the price paid to flint-slipped dirt wash-

#### ers has reached such a point that the

owners of shops are making ready to put up their shutters and settle back to the enjoyment of their long-stemmed pipes and their bungalow and fan tan till the trouble blows over. Hong Hai has a membership of from 700 to 800 and represents practically every Chinese laundryman in the city and adjacent suburbs, including owners and workers. When the laundry strike was declared, nearly four weeks ago, the Celestials who were operating basement laundries were for the most part getting an average price of 6 or 7 cents for washing a shirt. Hong Sing, a highlander of prominence among his people, decided it was well

#### that they should have a union, too, and

he organized all the washermen into one union or mission. Wages went up from \$12 to \$15 a week to as high as \$30 and the loose-garbed Mongolians labored at the tubs from daybreak to daybreak until sleep at last mastered them and they swayed off to their bunks and their solace of opium. As a result of the curbstone meeting Sunday night it was decided the men ought to have \$35 to \$40 a week, so they struck. The owners held a meeting tonight and concluded to shut up shop altogether. A few shops will try to remain open and get 15 cents for washing a shirt, but for the rest the lockout will be complete.

### DIVORCED WOMAN SHOOT A DOCTOR

Quarrel Arises Over Question as to Whether They Are Married.

URBANA, Ill., May 26.—Mrs. Susan Day, divorced wife of William A. Day, recently appointed assistant attorney general, fired four shots at Dr. Charles A. Nichols at her home here, narrowly missing him. Nichols, she asserts, returned the shots, but the facts do not bear out her statements, no trace of his bullets being found in the house.

Nichols was in the yard of the Day homestead walking toward the house when Mrs. Day opened fire on him through a window. She had threatened to shoot him unless he kept off the premises, a warning which he respected until last night. The shooting grew out of a controversy which has existed for some months between the two as to whether they are husband and wife.

Nichols, who is a practicing physician here, claims that he and Mrs. Day were united by a common law marriage in Louisville, Ky., in 1894. Mrs. Day, in spite of a mass of proof furnished by Nichols to bear out his statements, has persisted in contradicting his story, declaring that she is not his wife nor has she ever been. The division of considerable property left Mrs. Day by her father, the late Eli Halberstadt, depends upon the question of their marriage.

### INCITED WOMAN TO SUICIDE

For This Col. Jordan, of Galesburg, Is Indicted for Murder.

CHICAGO, May 26.—Col. Edward T. Jordan, of Galesburg, Ill., was indicted by the grand jury for inciting Mrs. Roma Snowball to commit suicide. He was charged with murder. Col. Jordan was held to the grand jury on testimony of Mrs. Snowball's husband, who testified that by his letters and otherwise he induced the woman to take her life.

### GROUPS ANARCHISTS AND RICH MEN TOGETHER

Father Grandchamp Says They Both Threaten the Nation's Life.

CROOKSTON, Minn., May 26.—In the baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class of the High school here Father Grandchamp, pastor of St. Anne's Catholic church of this city, made some sweeping statements. He declared that the rich men of the country and the anarchists and socialists were to be placed in the same class. He said the insatiable desire of men who were looking for wealth was the source of all the woes of the laboring men of the day. He declared that it was right and proper to get rich, but that the men of today had no consciences when it came to their dealings with the poor. The rich men on one side and the anarchists and socialists on the other threaten the life of the nation.

He declared the remedy for this lay not in new statutes but in new ideals of life. The trouble all arises from the wrong notions of life. Men should be made on a more noble plan than to look merely for selfish ends.

### MINISTERS ARE CALLED DOWN HARD

W. C. T. U. Rebukes Presbyterians for Patronizing Hotels That Sell Liquor.

#### LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 26.—The

W. C. T. U. sent a resolution to the Presbyterian general assembly today, which loosened a broad smile through the churches and much amusement among the galleries. It said: "Resolved, That we condemn the practice of Christian ministers and people stopping at hotels where liquor is sold and the employment from such hotels of caterers to serve in the case of social functions and banquets." This was designed to show the inconsistencies of Christian people and ministers in stopping at hotels where liquor is served and employment from such hotels of caterers at socials and banquets. The resolution probably will come up later in the week.

### SOUTHERN NEGROES WILL COME NORTH

South to Be Depopulated of Them and Northwest to Get Them.

BOSTON, Mass., May 26.—Plans have been completed by a secret organization, with headquarters in Boston, for the greatest negro exodus in history from the South. The originator of the society, numbering 600 members locally, is Rev. J. Henry Ducker, of Cambridge. The plan is to depopulate the entire Southern and Southwestern states of negroes, who will be brought North to Boston and thence distributed throughout the Northwest on ranches and farms.

The first great body of immigrants, numbering 1,000, will land in Boston about the 1st of July. Elaborate preparations are being made for their reception and rapid distribution where their labor is most needed. The Southern headquarters are in Georgia, but the precise location is kept secret, in fear of mob violence. Secret agents of the society are gathering negroes from all parts of the South.

### FILIPINO SUES OUR OWN MAJ. GLENN

Gabriel Galza Asks Damages for False Imprisonment.

#### MANILA, May 26.—Gabriel Galza, a

native living in the island of Leyte, has sued Maj. Edwin F. Glenn, of the Fifth infantry, for 15,000 pesos damages, on the ground of alleged false imprisonment. Galza, who was an insurgent sympathizer, was suspected of aiding the Samar insurgents. In 1901 he was arrested by Maj. Glenn's orders, Gen. Smith and the civil authorities of Leyte approving, and was confined in Samar. Ultimately Galza was released. Maj. Gen. Davis probably will refer the matter to Secretary Root.

Jumps From North-Western Train and Is Run Down by Relief Train.

Chicago & North-Western train was wrecked near Hawarden today by a washout. The engineer and fireman jumped. The injured fireman, Thomas Fisher, of Eagle Grove, Iowa, was placed in the rear coach. A relief train from Hawarden got beyond control of the engineer and crashed into the wrecked train, killing Fireman Fisher. The engineer was not seriously hurt. The passengers escaped with a shaking up.

### SECRETARY ROOT "JOSHES" GOV. TAFT

All Because Latter Attains the Dignity of 250 Pounds.

#### WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—

Manila papers publish the correspondence between Gov. Taft, of the Philippines and Secretary Root, at a time when anxiety was felt as to the health of the governor. Gov. Taft went to Benguet in answer to a cable April 17. Concerning his condition, he answered that he stood the trip well, and rode horseback twenty-five miles. The next day Secretary Root sent the following: "Referring to your telegram of April 17, how is your horse?" Gov. Taft weighs about 250 pounds, and Secretary Root could not resist the temptation to joke.

### BIG FORTUNE FOR KING ALFONSO

He Inherits \$7,500,000 From an Obliging Grandfather.

#### MADRID, May 26.—King Alfonso

has inherited \$7,500,000 under the will of his grandfather, King Francis. The will was opened a month ago, in accordance with the desire of King Francis that it should not be read until twelve months after his death. Don Francis d'Assasi, Duke of Cadiz, who married his cousin, Queen Isabella II. of Spain, Oct. 10, 1846, and was the same day proclaimed king of Spain, was the father of the late King Alfonso XII, father of the present king of Spain. Queen Isabella, July 25, 1870, formally abdicated the throne in Paris, in favor of her son, the late King Alfonso. Don Francis died at Epinay, France, April 16, 1902.

### PREACHER WILL ENTER RESTAURANT BUSINESS

Episcopal Rector of Oshkosh, Wis., Has the Fire Full of Irons.

OSHKOSH, Wis., May 26.—Rev. Merton C. Andrews, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church, of this city, is about to embark in the restaurant business. He has purchased a cafe and will furnish and equip it. He was subjected to an ecclesiastical trial and was acquitted.
