GANS IS TOO MUCH FOR FITZGERALD

Baltimore Wonder Puts New Yorker Out in Tenth Round.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 29.—The Gans-Fitzgerald fight at Mechanics Pavilion was an easy victory for the Baltimore wonder. It ended suddenly in the tenth, when the negro put in a terrific left to the jaw, dazing Fitzgerald. The New Yorker tried to fight back, but was too far gone, and a right cross to the jaw put him out for good.

It was Gans' fight throughout. Only in one round—the ninth—did Fitzgerald have even a shade the better of it. In this round he put his left to the negro's stomach and body frequently and Gans was guessing for the time being. The tenth round was all Gans up to the time of the knockout. The New Yorker was ready and willing to mix it at every stage of the game, and really did some good work against the Baltimore man, but the negro far outclassed him in cleverness and landed upon him almost at will.

SAYS LAW IS VIOLATED.

Rev. Louis Richter Expresses Opinion of Action Excommunicating Him.

Rev. Louis Richter, the Minneapolis minister who was recently excommunicated from the church by the Presbyterian general assembly at Los Angeles because of his views on the liquor question, has today issued a statement in which he roundly criticized the high- tribunal of the church for the action taken. NEEDS TAKEN OUT BY MAGNET.

For removing from the stomach metallic objects that are attracted by the magnet, Dr. Mayo has devised a method that requires no cutting. A small electromagnet is arranged to slide in a tube similar to a stomach pump, and the apparatus is passed into the stomach through the mouth, when the magnet draws the foreign body into the tube. By lifting up the stomach with X-rays, the operator is enabled to see the magnet into contact with the metal at the point most suitable to enter the tube.—American Inventor.

TO MT. BLANC'S TOP ON TROLLEY CAR.

Plans have been drawn up for an electric railway from Le Fayet, about twelve miles from Chamounix, the summit of Mont Blanc. The first section to be con- structed is to include in its stations the mountain of the Col de Voie, Mount Lachat, Les Rogmes and Tete Rousse, the pro- visional terminus being L'Aiguille du Gouter, at 12,600 feet above the mean level of the sea. The latter line is to be prolonged to the summit, 15,780 feet above the sea- level. The municipal council of St. Ger- val has approved the scheme and granted the concession.—New York World.
