

A NOVEL COAT.

Something of One of the New Things Which Wearers of Modish Furs Will Affect Next Season.

A decidedly new and novel effect in fur coats is promised next season's fur wearers. The designs and patterns of this new creation have just been received by E. Albrecht & Son, the furriers, at 20 East Seventh street, from their head designer, who is at present traveling throughout the old country in search of the very latest styles in vogue at Old World centers.

This garment is the newest design of the Paris fashion makers, and is intended strictly as a "dressy" creation. The original, which is due to arrive at Albrecht's in a day or two, is made of Persian lamb, trimmed with dark brown mink. It is made with the blouse effect in front and with a novel skirt cut with frock ends in the back. The sleeves are of the baggy elbow pattern, which is the latest design in fur sleeves for the coming season.
