Dr. Frankforter Possesses Sample of Salt of the Three New Metals.

The small phial of powder which Dr. George P. Frankforter, dean of the school of chemistry at the University of Chicago, carried around in his pocket is theoretically said to be worth \$100,000. ROME, June 15.—The Biblical committee appointed by the pope, and numbering among its members the greatest Biblical scholars of all countries, including Prof. Charles P. Grant, of the Catholic university at Washington, is about to submit to the pontiff an important proposal providing for the creation of a superior institute of Biblical studies. The most learned professors will be gathered within the institute to direct the studies of a plethoric number of students, and the institute will devote themselves entirely to the study of learning with the object of forming an authoritative organization ready to give a weighty opinion on scriptural questions.
