

CHAMPIONSHIP IS VIGNAUX'S

NEW YORK, June 23.—When Maurice Vignaux, the French champion, recently stated a verdict from a Parisian court declaring him the world's champion, much discussion was aroused among local billiardists. Winning championships in courts of law is not regarded with much favor by Americans.

The tournament out of which the litigation grew was to settle the world's championship, and when it was first arranged the managers expected so large a number of entries that the playing off of the title would be impossible. Therefore a clause was inserted in the conditions providing that in case of ties the first prize and the championship title should go to the player making the highest grand average.

Owing to the failure of Schaefer, the champion and several other great players to enter the tournament, only four competitors were in line when play started. These were George Slosson, of New York; George Sutton, of Chicago, and Vignaux and Cure, the Frenchmen.

With so small an entry list, the playing off of ties became a necessity, and all four players verbally consented to do so. Then the managers of the tournament were called upon to make a regulation. They failed to change the "tie" clause in the written regulations. The tournament resulted in a triple tie between Vignaux, Sutton and Cure, Slosson falling to win a game. Vignaux had the best grand average by a margin above Sutton, the Frenchman, ignoring his promise, took advantage of the written rule and claimed the championship. Sutton and Cure, however, promptly took the matter into court and got a decision.

The style of play in the tournament was 18.2 (eighteen-inch ball line, with two shots in), and Vignaux undoubtedly will claim the championship at that rate of play.

"I do not believe," said Maurice Daly, "that the billiard world will recognize Vignaux's claim, notwithstanding the decision of the court. It is unportsmanlike on his part and a singular exhibition of childishness."

"By reason of his victory at Madison Square Concert hall in the last tournament Schaefer is the champion at 18.1, and there is a marked difference in the two styles of play there should be a division of championship honors. There is nearly as much difference between 18.1 and 18.2 as there is between 18.1 and cushion caroms.

"Although Vignaux is now fifty-one years old, he showed by his work in the Paris tournament that he is still able to cope with any living player, either in match or tournament, and his habitish action is all the more inexplicable.

LOCOMOTIVE CONCERN

CHICAGO, June 26.—Bankruptcy proceedings were commenced today against the Locomotive Corporation, an Illinois concern, having a plant at Hammond, Ind., were begun by creditors in the United States district court today. Judge Kohlsaat appointed Edwin C. Potter, Chicago, receiver for the corporation in the hands of \$100,000.

At the same time Mr. Potter was also appointed receiver for the firm of Torbert & Peckham, the predecessors of the Locomotive Corporation. The assets of the latter organization are in the neighborhood of \$300,000, but the liabilities are unknown.

With reference to the appointment of a receiver the firm of Torbert & Peckham, formerly John D. Duff, representing Frederick M. Peckham, said tonight:

"The firm of Torbert & Peckham was dissolved six months ago, its matter settled and its property distributed. Mr. Peckham is in no way interested in the present receivership. The proceedings were without any knowledge on the part of Mr. Peckham, who has no interest in the United States Locomotive Corporation, of which Mr. Torbert was the moving spirit. Mr. Peckham is entirely solvent, and so far as the receiver is concerned, he has no recollections thereof absolutely."
