DOG SWALLOWED \$52 IN A CHAMOIS PURSE

Valuable Bull Dog Belonging to an Editor Has a Record.

That the appetite for indigestible articles is common to the goat has been proven by a valuable bulldog owned by Thomas J. Hamlin, editor of the Union.

The dog, which is about two years old, has been in the habit of playing about the house, frequently getting under ornaments, books, fancy work and other articles usually within reach.

At one time Mr. Hamlin noticed that the dog seemed to be in pain, he whined continually, would eat nothing and was restless.

Investigation revealed the fact that the dog had swallowed a small atomizer and a rubber ball.

Last Saturday morning, before starting for town, the dog went to a table on which he had placed a chamois skin purse containing \$52 in gold and bills the night before.

Shortly afterwards the dog came into the room apparently much depressed and lifeless. Regarding the symptoms the doctor, who had been consulted, appeared when the dog had swallowed the atomizer, and knowing his appetite for articles of all kinds, Mr. Hamlin's suspicions were at once aroused.

Yesterday morning the dog was taken to a veterinary surgeon for an examination. Bismuth was injected into the stomach, but this failed to produce any result.

The animal was then subjected to an examination under the strong test of the X-rays. To the astonishment of the surgeon the purse was located in the dog's stomach, and the two-dollar gold piece which was in the purse was plainly visible.

Owing to the location of the money the veterinary said that it would be impossible to operate successfully on the dog and he was not willing to attempt it.

Mr. Hamlin, however, is anxious to save the animal if possible, as it is a valuable one. He consulted one of the leading surgeons in Minneapolis yesterday, and the latter agreed to operate on the dog.
