GETTING LANDS AWAY FROM SOUTH DAKOTA INDIANS

Inspector McLaughlin Negotiating a Treaty at Rosebud Agency for the Opening of 416,000 Acres to Settlement.

Special to The Globe. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Aug. 1.—Information has been received here that Maj. James McLaughlin, inspector of the Indian bureau at Washington, who arrived at Rosebud agency last Tuesday to secure the signatures of the Indians to an amended treaty for the opening of settlement of 416,000 acres of their reservation, situated in Gregory county, is meeting with good success and will complete the work in a few days.

United States Senator Gamble, who has taken a personal interest in the efforts to secure the opening of the land to settlement, stated that he was confident the treaty now being negotiated by Maj. McLaughlin will be ratified by congress, either at the coming special session or during the regular session.

There will be no free homes provision to the bill which will be presented to congress. It will provide for the sale of the land by the Indians at \$25 per acre—the highest price. It is believed, ever paid the Indians by the government for land surrendered by them. This is made payable, 50 cents per acre when the land is filed on by white settlers, and an additional 50 cents each year until the full amount is paid. The entire sum thus secured from the land will be turned over to the Indians entitled to it.

MISSING A FORTUNE.

"Duke of Wellington" Was Not a Prophet as to Dakota Values.

Wellington, a white-haired old gentleman, who now resides at Norwood, Mass., was a pioneer settler in McCook county, west of Sioux Falls, and has only recently learned how he, for less than \$500, let a farm now worth \$10,000 slip through his fingers.

In pioneer days he made entry of 320 acres of land in Jefferson township, McCook county. After locating upon the tract he returned to the East for his wife, but she declined to remove to Dakota, which had at that time the name of being the home of the Indian, the blizzard and the rattlesnake.

The "duke" afterwards sold relinquishments to his land for less than \$500. Today the tract abandoned by him is in a thickly settled part of the state.

INJURED IN A BALL GAME.


Duluth Young Woman Is Struck by a Batted Ball.
