CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 2.—Three explosions today on the Austrian steamer Vaskapu, soon after it left the Bulgarian port of Burgas en route for Constantinople, killed twenty-nine persons. The vessel caught fire and had to be beached.

KILLS HER HE LOVES

H. T. Edson, Defaulter, Murders Mrs. Pullen and Kills Himself.

NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—Henry Townsend Edson, son of Franklin Edson, formerly mayor of New York city, in his apartments at 292 West Ninety-second street, today shot and instantly killed Mrs. Fannie Pullen and then shot and killed himself. The murder and suicide appear to have been premeditated and followed a dramatic scene in which Edson asked Mrs. Pullen, a close and honored friend of his wife and family, to desert her husband and children and fly with him into another state. Mrs. Pullen was a beautiful woman and is said to have been the daughter of a United States naval officer.

HALF MILLION SHORT

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 2.—William T. Tucker, trustee, with his mother, of the estate of his father, the late Wesley A. Tucker, is said to have disappeared from his home. OYSTER BAY, L. I., Sept. 2.—A man giving his name as Henry Wellbrenner was arrested at Sagamore Hill late last night while making a persistent demand to see President Roosevelt. The man was taken to the village and placed in the town prison. Shortly after 10 o'clock Wellbrenner drove to Sagamore Hill in a buggy. He was stopped by the secret service operative on duty. Wellbrenner said he had a personal engagement with the president and desired to see him. As it was long after the hours when visitors are received the officer declined to permit him to go to the house. The man insisted, but the officer turned him away.

GRAIN MEN GRIEVE

Complain That the Steamship Combine Will Kill Their Trade.

Special to The Globe. CHICAGO, Sept. 2.—Grain shippers are loudly complaining that the new trans-Atlantic steamship combine is going to be the death of their trade. The International Mercantile Marine company refuses to carry grain at less than 8 cents a bushel. The consequence is that shipments are being diverted to Canadian and Southern ports. There are three routes. One from Duluth and Chicago via the lakes, Canadian Trunk lines and canals. The second is the rail and water route via the lower lakes. The third is the 7 cent rate on grain from Chicago to New York via the Trunk line. The last is the minimum rate of the steamship lines.
