MORE LEG-PULLING

Canal Terms Colombia Now Presumes to Dictate.

BOGOTA, Sept. 8.—The bill which congress is now discussing, authorizing President Marroquin to negotiate a new Panama canal treaty with the United States, contains the following stipulations: The perpetual use of the canal zone is granted provided that at the expiration of each hundred years the United States shall pay during the succeeding hundred years 25 per cent of the premium and rental then for the preceding term, the premium beginning at \$400,000 and the rental at \$400.

ATTEMPTED HOLDUP IS FRUSTRATED

Bitter Root Express Gets Away From Three Robbers.

STEVENSVILLE, Mont., Sept. 7.—A hold attempt to hold up the Bitter Root express, just east of here, today, was frustrated by the vigilance of the crew. A pile of ties had been placed on the tracks. Father Lochman ended his sermon by denouncing the practice of young people parading the streets at night, which he said was productive of more evil than all the other influences combined. There are 500 children in his parish school, and the new order has created something of a sensation among the parishioners.


POSTOFFICE CLERKS DISCUSS THEIR DESIRES

Bad Result of Postal Investigation Referred to in a Report.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 8.—The first business of the second day's session of the National Postal Association, Postoffice Clerks was the submission of the annual report of Editor Scott, of the Postal, followed by Secretary Loeffler. The report called attention to the delay in distributing funds appropriated for increasing salaries on account of the postal fraud investigation. Mr. Loeffler said the matter of promotions had not been given proper consideration and advocated a mandatory classification. The report shows that during the past year seventy-nine branches were formed, twelve reorganized and 2,059 new members elected.
