Three Thousand Followers of Dowie Start for New York City.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—The "restoration host" from Zion City began its movement upon New York city today. At intervals of one-half hour trainloads of the followers of John Alexander Dowie left the North Shore city.

Speaking in Chicago Former President Offers Solution for Corrupt Politics.

CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—"Give to our people something that will concentrate their common affection and solicitous care—and let that be their country's good; give them a purpose that stimulates them to unite in lofty endeavors—and let that purpose be a demonstration of the efficiency and beneficence of our popular rule." WILL FIGHT TRUST


Crucible Steel Company to Operate Independent Works.
