



Michigan next!

The game with Beloit has been played and now there is nothing but five days of practice between the Minnesota team and the game that will practically decide whether or not the Gophers are to be the Western champions for 1903.

Next Saturday afternoon the big game of the Western football world will be played on great Northrop field by the Minnesota and Michigan teams. Wisconsin and Chicago may claim the right to be mentioned with the Gophers and the Wolverines, and later on both Minnesota and Michigan may drop back with the also rans, but the game Saturday, like the game between Michigan and Wisconsin last season, is to be the big game of the season.

It will be the big game and it will be played before the banner crowd. Already the sale of tickets threatens to exceed even the most reckless guesses of the management and it can be safely said that between 25,000 and 30,000 will see the game.

This week the Minnesota management will put a large force of builders at work and new stands will be erected at each end of the big field. If necessary every available inch of space surrounding the gridiron will be used for temporary stands and with the new field insured against accident, it is safe to promise that there will be no repetition of the accident at Chicago last season.

The big stands already up have been thoroughly inspected and the more timid ones can, if they hurry, secure seats in these stands. The late comers will have to content themselves with what is left and the ones who delay to the last will without doubt be able to secure nothing better than general admission tickets and a standing-room privilege.

The result of this game is bothering the enthusiasts. Minnesota supporters are more confident than ever before that Minnesota is to be the team that will furnish Coach Yost his Waterloo, but Minnesota was confident last season and Yost smiled his quiet smile and "hurred up."

This season, however, the confidence is not entirely worked up by enthusiastic desire to see Minnesota win. This season Minnesota has a team that has already demonstrated its right to hold the respect of the critical ones.

Minnesota has a fast team, a team that is an improvement on the team that met Michigan last season. Michigan has a fast team, but the Wolverines of today are not the Wolverines who tore through Minnesota's line last season. Minnesota has a better team this season; Michigan has an inferior team.

Weeks is missing, Sweeley is missing and other stars are gone from the Michigan team and new men must face the Gophers. They may not prove strong enough to do what the stars did last season, and then, again, they may turn out to be new stars.

Minnesota has a better chance to beat Michigan than she ever had before, but in knowing this the Minnesota following should not allow their enthusiasm to run away with their judgment. Yost has the nasty habit of being able to whip speed and team work into players, and Yost has been working as hard at Michigan this year as he ever worked before and perhaps a bit harder.


The best hope possible for the Minnesota men who are planning on backing the Gophers is that necessary odds against Michigan, is something like the following:



### LOU DILLON AGAIN AHEAD OF CRESCUS

#### Queen of Trotters Makes Mile Under Adverse Circumstances in 1:58 1/2.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 24.—Lou Dillon, the peerless trotter, driven by Millard Sanders, this afternoon proved her right to the proud title of "queen of the turf" by trotting a mile under adverse circumstances in the remarkable time of 1:58 1/2. The daughter of Sidney Dillon was paced by a runner driven by Scott McCoy, and another runner followed closely by the drivers of the runners, dashed under the wire in 1:58 1/2.

When the time was flashed to the spectators, hats were flung high into the air and cheer followed cheer. Sanders was literally lifted from his sulky by the throng, while Mr. Billings was showered with congratulations.

**Timers' Watches Agree.**

It was a noticeable fact that the watches of the three official timers agreed to the fraction, and many horsemen standing in the infield caught the time as officially announced. The timers were Bud Loebler, Fred Hartwell and John Dickerson.

After the mare had been blanketed and sent to her barn, Sanders said: "I am not a bit surprised at the result of Lou Dillon's effort. I expected to break the world's record despite the adverse conditions. I wish to say that it is my opinion that Lou Dillon can trot as fast as any horse in the world can pace and next year I will demonstrate this statement. With her performance today I would be afraid to say how fast the mare could trot the mile."

Two other records were broken. Daniel, a bay mare by Alexander, driven by McDaniel, paced a mile in 2:00 1/4. The former pacing record for a mare held by Fannie Dilard was 2:03 1/4. Equity and The Monk were sent a mile against the 2:12 1/4 trotting to pole record. The two horses were driven by Mr. Billings and passed under the wire in 2:09 1/4.

**Results at Brighton Beach.**

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—The second half of the Produce stakes of \$5,000, for colts and geldings, the feature of the closing day of the Brighton Beach racing association autumn meeting, was won in a driving finish by E. R. Thorne, Sr., favorite in the betting, with M. L. Hayman's Orthodox second.

Five good two-year-olds responded to the bugle call and the field was sent away to a good start. Stalwart and Dick Turpin ran head and head to the stretch, where Dick Turpin dropped back beaten.

In the stretch Orthodox made a determined bid, but was never able to catch the leader, Stalwart, who won by a length. Orthodox being two lengths in front of Dick Turpin, Kohnoor, an added starter, finished fourth.
