AN IMPRESSIONIST PICTURE

Sketch of One of Whistler's Drawings in Sunbeam Exhibit.

Mrs. Arthur E. Clark, of St. Paul, president of the Sunbeam band, has made the above excellent pen and ink sketch of Whistler's "Alice," which is one of the canvases in the art exhibit held in the building, 11 East Sixth street. A few months before his death the artist painted the picture for a New York man. After it had hung

in the latter's gallery for a while the owner, it is said, cabied Whistler to come and finish the painting. Perhaps the majority of people who have looked at the picture since it has been in St. Paul would echo the New York man's opinion that it is unfinished. It is very amusing, indeed, to stand at the entrance to the exhibit room and watch the expression on the faces of the vis-

itors after the Whistler painting has been pointed out to them. The majority of them give a little gasp and then, for a minute, look decidedly foolish. Whatever they have expected, it is very evident that "Alice" in no way represents it. Yet a local critic has said this of the canvas: "It is the fleeting impression of a child's face, daubed on a canvas by a great artist."
