







WINNINGS NOT REAL

Newspapers Responsible for Smathers' Reputation.

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 7.—The life of a race track plunger is a profitable one on paper, but a failure when the real returns are counted, according to statements made by E. E. Smathers, the double-gaited horse fancier and reputed plunger, who has posed before the horse world this season through his operations at trotting and running tracks.

The weekly coups completed by the Smathers following were numerous and overbalanced the losses by the million mark named. "As a matter of fact," said Mr. Smathers, speaking of his operations in betting rings on trotting and running tracks, "the largest amount I won during the season on any specified race was \$25,000, which represented a combined commission sent in by myself, C. C. Christie and two other friends. We bet on Irene Lindsey the other day she won at Gravesend, Brighton, Sheephead Bay, Readeville, Memphis and the Chicago tracks of \$1,000,100.
