# MUSIC

Among the best things that this country has to offer musically is undoubtedly the Theodore Thomas orchestra. Chicago possesses it, but America owns it. National appreciation has earned the latter this right of ownership. St. Paul will hear the orchestra in three programmes this week at the People's church, on Thursday evening, on Friday evening and on Saturday afternoon. Musically methods and a rigid adherence to the highest ideals have made the orchestra what it is today, an organization of artists under the leadership of a virtuoso. The Thomas orchestra has always given its entire attention to highly polished, pedestal style like cut, size of top 4x14, in round or square 6 inch extension. Special Monday and Tuesday day.

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Frederick A. Stock will wield the baton during the St. Paul engagement. He is a conductor new to the Northwest, but he has aroused enthusiasm in Chicago, which is the best proof that could be given, perhaps, of his ability. Chicagoans familiar with Thomas' leadership would hardly have any doubts as to the quality of the Thomas standard. The programmes that have been arranged for Thursday and Friday nights and for Saturday afternoon are the most melodious that the orchestra has ever given here.

There are imposing names on the programmes, names connected with great compositions, but the music that will be played will be enjoyed by those who have no special knowledge of music, but who love a "concert of sweet sounds."

The soloists include Miss Jenny Osborn, a lyrical soprano; Stenlund, the cellist; and Kramer, the violinist, who will play Mozart's great concerto.

The St. Paul Choral club has most wisely decided to give the "Hora Novissima" in the original Latin text. This much-praised work of Horatio W. Parker is built upon the Latin hymn, and in the exemplification of the theme it has lost nothing of its hymn quality. Like the singing by the Choral club of last year of Verdi's requiem, the "Hora Novissima" will mean something new to the majority of the audience, for this work of Mr. Parker's has not been produced west of Chicago. The rehearsals are progressing most satisfactorily, so the concert, which will be given Tuesday evening, Nov. 24, in the People's church, promises to be a brilliant one. Besides the "Hora Novissima," "The Swan and the Skylark," a cantata that fits in most satisfactorily with the Parker production, will be given. The concert will be given with full orchestral accompaniment, and with the following soloists: Miss Gordon, soprano; Mrs. Eleanor Kirkham, Chicago, contralto; Edward Strong, recently of Northfield, tenor; and William Howland, director of music at Ann Arbor, baritone. The Choral club is desirous of adding to its list of associate members in order that the organization may rest upon a firm financial basis and permanency be assured it.

MUSICAL NOTES.  
Herbert Foster Sprague, the new organist and choirmaster of the Central Presbyterian church, gave his first recital in this city last Tuesday evening in the church. In the programme that he presented Mr. Sprague displayed the possession of most musically qualities, qualities that belong to the enthusiast as well as to the scholar. He played some great music, the Mendelssohn sixth sonata, for instance, and the Bach fugue in A Major and two of Gullmatt's compositions, the seventh sonata, a new composition by the great French organist, and the "allegro in E" movement from his Organ symphony. His reading of each was impressive, for in each was revealed appreciation of the underlying motif that was the composer's inspiration. The impressive dignity that characterized the Mendelssohn sonata from the exquisite chorale to the lofty finale lost nothing at the hands of the musician. It was presented with firm sympathy that made his audience forget the technical skill that was his foundation. The Bach and the Gullmatt sonatas, especially the bizarre sonata of the latter, received equally satisfactory interpretations. In these the audience enjoyed some fine organ harmonies and in the more descriptive compositions, the "Fast Lux" and the "Chant Pastorale" by Dubois, and Volstenholme's "Die Frage" and "Die Antwort," the instrument, under the facile fingers of the player, Solo and Quartette—"Heaven Is My Home".....George B. Children's school coats are very simple this year, the main idea being warmth and usefulness, for the very cold months. They are made full length and when in a material like kersey or melton are very durable, affording in stormy weather a protection almost equal to cravenette. The one illustrated today is in deep wine red kersey cloth, with a full box back. The panels bordering front continue in hand, finished by collarless neck and groups of fine black silk soutache trim, ending under small black velvet buttons. A wide shoulder cape has a slight point at back, and rows of stitching finish border, also hem of coat. The stole collar and the cuffs are of Bulgarian embroidery, giving a delightful bit of coloring, and are detachable, for as the winter advances a fur tippet and gauntlets are more suitable. The little fur sets are rather limited as to variety; ermine being one of the few furs set apart for children, squirrel another and chinchilla the
