



KETTLE RIVER SANDSTONE QUARRIES AT SANDSTONE, MINN.

Among the many natural resources of Minnesota, the immense deposits of stone, comprising a great variety of granite, quartzite, sandstone and limestone, comprise a considerable one. There are various quarries throughout the Northwest of undisputed value, but none are more deserving of special mention, as of general interest, than The Kettle River Quarries, at Sandstone, Minn.

An important and growing industry has grown up in and about these quarries, made possible by their size, with the wonderful deposits of beautiful and durable stone rising one hundred and forty feet above the banks of the river, the extent of the operations carried on there, and the varied uses to which the product has come, in these latter days, to be put. Some idea of the extent and ca-

capacity of the quarries and the plant installed for their operation may be gained from the above cut. However, the view compasses but a part of the workings, and gives but a feeble idea of the vast resources of the stone deposits there. Nor can anything like a comprehensive idea of the plant and machineries required for the quarrying and producing of the stone be gained from the illustration.

The popularity of the Kettle River Sandstone, not only as a building material, but for street paving as well, has been increasing with wonderful rapidity in the past few years, and a considerable quantity of the stone has been used by the cities of St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth. A large portion of the new street paving laid during the past two years in the cities mentioned has

been of this stone, this including as well the curbing, the streets of the residence as well as of the wholesale and business districts coming in for their share of the sandstone paving. This paving has proven most satisfactory even after years of service, combining, as it does, to a large degree, the best qualities required in paving materials, durability and evenness of surface where properly

laid. It is comparatively free from dust and noise and presents an attractive surface, besides which it does not become slippery, as some other paving materials do, proving a source of no small amount of annoyance to drivers of horses. One point which has attracted much attention to the stone and which renders it very desirable as a building stone is the fact that it

will withstand all changes of climate. Hence it is especially valuable as the material for use in bridge work, heavy masonry and curbing. The market for the Kettle River Sandstone is not confined to the Twin Cities or the Northwest by any manner of means, but extends the country over, from New York to Seattle, from the Gulf to Canada.
